Coach's Corner

Loose Ends

Dear Friends,

There is a website called Latitude 38, which refers to the Bay Area's latitude in the northern hemisphere. Here you you can place your name as a crew member, if you're willing to go on a sailboat with other people. Sometimes there are even possibilities of sailing all the way to Tahiti. About eight years ago, when I put my name on that site, even though my skills were at the bottom of basic, four people from a sailing club in Marin county asked me to join them and share the cost of boat rental for four days of sailing off the coast of Southern California and around Catalina Island. I could not say no to that. We slept on the boat and moved every day. It was a learning experience, for they all knew each other and more about sailing than I did. There are so many halyards, lines, and ropes on a good-sized sailboat that one thing you learn quickly is never step on any lines or leave any lines lying around. No loose ends. It goes without saying that I raised a few eyebrows with my inexperience, but you learn quickly that way.

In last month's Coach's Corner, I told you I was passing you the binoculars and that it was my job to help keep the ship steady, so I thought I'd continue the maritime metaphor here. We may not succeed fully, but I want to leave you with as much clarity as possible and with as much bandwidth as possible to focus on your unique ministry as a congregation. To start off with clarity, this is what I wish for: for you and I together to tie loose ends.

- First, this involves maintenance to our aging buildings.
- Second, it involves improvements to our campus.
- Third, it means reviewing the safety policies the session adopted under Chelsea Page's leadership and make sure they will be ready to be implemented consistent with the policy but in a way the whole congregation can live with.
- Fourth, it involves continuity as you rethink the role of residents in preparation for new pastoral leadership and the congregational dialogue it will necessitate.

But there is one more thing, and this has to do with what I am hoping to work on as a volunteer after my disembarkation from the Parkview vessel, namely spreading the concept of our residency program beyond Parkview and even this Presbytery. This means I need help putting together a high quality presentation of what we have accomplished together that will be meaningful to other churches in this challenging time of social, cultural, and generational transition. I hope some of you will be willing to help me with that. Please let me know what other loose ends I've missed, so nobody steps on them and trips up.

May God bless our ministry. See you in church. Aart

It isn't hard for me to distinguish the difference between one third and one fourth, for instance. But someone else had to help me learn it before I knew it.
