Thoughts on Prayer

Have you ever noticed that when it comes to the Lord's Prayer, the Presbyterians are the only ones who say "Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors"? All other denominations, the Lutherans, Episcopalians, Catholics, Methodists, etc.



say "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespassed against us." When Presbyterians say the prayer, it's definitely more succinct! But it is also a nod to our Scottish heritage. John Knox, who was based out of Edinburgh, Scotland, really helped formalize the Presbyterian denomination. So why do we say "debts" instead of "trespasses"? Rev. John Stuart, the pastor of Erin Presbyterian Church in Knoxville, Tennessee, has provided a good explanation:

"Most of what we believe as Presbyterians comes from Scotland. In Scotland, there is no law of trespass, unlike their English counterparts. This meant that when it came to saying the Lord's Prayer, the words 'trespass' and 'trespasses' had no meaning for the Scots people. Scots, however, knew all about debts and debtors because it was mainly a merchant economy in the 16th century. Calvinists also believed in the substitutionary atonement of Christ, which emphasizes the fact that Jesus sacrificially substituted Himself on the Cross for us. This means that we are completely indebted to Him, so when we say 'forgive us our debts' in the Lord's Prayer, we are actually saying, "Forgive us of the sinful things in our lives that nailed Jesus to the Cross." And when we add the phrase 'as we forgive our debtors,' we are actually asking God to forgive us in the same way that we deal with the personal injuries, wounds, and hurts which other people inflict upon us."

So now, my friends, whenever you pray "Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors," you know the deeper meaning behind it. May we all do our part to be intentional about forgiveness for ourselves, for each other, and to God.

We have followed the floral tradition established by Toshi Tambara for many years, but some changes are necessary due to current COVID-19 concerns. Below is a summary of the revised floral donation process approved by the PPW cabinet.

- Donors will receive a reminder email about a month ahead of their scheduled Sunday from either Haruko Sakakibara or Judy Yee, the flower coordinators.
- The donor is now in charge of both the floral presentation and clean up.
- Donations should be fresh flowers arranged in vases/containers or floral plants in pots. If you bring in loose flowers/bouquet, there are vases below the kitchen sink available for your use.
- Please place the arrangement on the altar in the sanctuary by 9:45 am and remove it after the service.
- If the donors will not be physically present at church, they can prearrange with a church volunteer to handle their flowers. Please make a request and provide details when you respond to the initial email reminder you receive from us.

We have a rotation of volunteers to ensure the smooth flow of altar floral presentations: Haruko (1st Sunday), Judy (2nd Sunday), Cathy (3rd Sunday) and Donna (4th Sunday). We are seeking a volunteer for the occasional 5th Sunday and to serve as an alternate. If you can help, please contact Haruko.
