### Dear Friends,

It's been more than 40 years, and I still don't know who gave me that enormous Valentine card. The almost-as-tall-asme card that was propped outside my residence hall door on Feb 14 at the University of Kent in Canterbury. People in England signed their Valentines with silly rhymes like "looney tooney" or "kissy wissy," instead of their real name. It was likely from a friend in the Christian fellowship group, but no one ever 'fessed up' to putting it there. I have an idea who may have left it: a friend from a group I hiked the Lake District with later that Spring. I could try to find him on Facebook and ask if he was the phantom card giver. But sometimes it's fun just to keep things a mystery.

Maybe it's because my paternal ancestors immigrated from Scotland and Ireland, but I've always been drawn to Celtic spirituality, which celebrates the mystery in life. When our daughter, Chelsea, and I visited Iona the year she studied at University of St. Andrews in Scotland, I came across a book of Celtic blessings, *Benedictus*, by poet John O'Donohue. I loved O'Donohue's notion of "this shy inner light that enables us to recognize and receive our very presence here as blessing."

I had heard many people talk about Iona as a 'thin place'- holy ground where the veil between this world and the eternal one is thin, places where we can sense God's presence in profound ways. *New York Times* columnist Eric Weiner describes these places where the distance between heaven and earth seem to collapse. "The ancient pagan Celts, and later, Christians, used the term to describe mesmerizing places like the wind-swept isle of Iona. Heaven and earth, the Celtic saying goes, are only three feet apart, but in thin places that distance is even shorter . . . . Thin places transform us — or, more accurately, unmask us. In thin places, we become our more essential selves."

The windswept isle of Iona didn't feel thin to me during that November visit; it just felt cold. But several years later, on a trip to Israel, the Garden of Gethsemane was exquisitely thin. Where and when we will come across thin places

in life remains a mystery. But those may be times where we return to that first garden, times where we experience the unity with God we used to have, and long for now. Maybe thin places offer glimpses not of heaven, but of earth as it's really meant to be. Just one look in our own backyards reminds us of the rest of the story: Paradise Lost. Sin entered the world through the willful disobedience of our ancestors, Adam and Eve, and their fellowship with God was broken. But we were created for companionship with our Creator, and that's why we keep listening for God's voice, and longing for God's company. This Valentine's Day, celebrate the people in your life who fill your heart with love, with hugs, with chocolate, and maybe even an enormous card. May you be captivated and comforted knowing, as John O'Donohue says, "the urgency with which God longs for you" and celebrate your very presence here on earth as blessing.

### W.O.W.! "Whispers of Worship"

During the season of Lent (the 40 days leading up to Easter), which begins on Sunday, Mar 6, the worship team will be inviting you to share your "W.O.W." moments from worshipping



together. A W.O.W. (Whisper of Worship) might be something that struck you during worship that you'll think about during the week. It might be a memory or a feeling or nudge that came to you. W.O.W.s can be prompted by the scripture readings, the children's message, the music, the sermon, or they might be something that you have never heard or thought of before. Everyone's W.O.W. is different and unique! Our prayer is that by sharing our Whispers of Worship, we'll be drawn closer to each other and to God, and that it will help us all to listen more closely for those "whispers" we might otherwise miss.

If you attend in-person worship, you'll be given a post-it note with your bulletin and there will be time to reflect and write a few words during the service. Afterward, we hope you'll leave your post-it notes on a white board that will be provided in the social hall, so we can share those Whispers together. It's up to you whether you include your name or not. If you are attending worship via Zoom, we hope you'll share in the Zoom chat, or email your Whispers to the church office during the week, and we'll add those to the W.O.W.s that are left on the board.

We'll be sharing more as the time gets closer, but it's never too early to be listening for those Whispers of Worship that touch you each Sunday as we draw closer to each other and to God during worship. What other response could there be to God's amazing love, but, "WOW!"? We look forward to worshiping with you!

### A Day in the Life as a PPA

I was "volunteered" to write a short description of our tasks and duties as a Parkview Parking Attendant (PPA). Before I begin, I would like to thank all the volunteers for sacrificing their Sunday mornings to be a PPA. We get up very early,



(some at 5 am), just to be the first person at church. Hach Yasumura was the exception, because he beat us to church EVERY Sunday to make coffee and set up. I am sad to see Hach retire and will miss his coffee.

My Sunday morning as a PPA starts by checking to see if anyone is parking in our spaces. Next, I set up the barriers and rope off the back lot. Once the barrier is up, I open up the church.

I start with unlocking the sliding gate (the combination is stored in my phone's address book), then proceed to unlocking the rest of the church. I go back to the parking lot and check to see if anyone tried to sneak under the rope. If all is good, I head back inside to turn on all the lights.
