Dear Friends,

Have you ever been cleaning out your storage closet or attic and come across the Easter decorations? And dig through the Easter grass at the bottom of an Easter basket to find a leftover jelly bean or two? Well, here are a few nuggets of Easter wisdom I came across recently. File these under "Things We Learned from Easter Egg Hunts:"

- How is it for 364 days of the year adults say, "What are you doing? We do not eat things we find on the ground!" But on Easter, those same adults say, "C'mon kids, let's go out and search in the grass and dirt for eggs a strange animal left for you!"
- If six kids can pick up 200 eggs in a grassy area the size of a football field in ten minutes, why does it take two kids two months to pick up five toys in a small bedroom?
- If you see a rabbit laying little brown eggs, don't eat them. They're not chocolate.

I wonder what people in America think when they read the story of Jesus rising from the dead for the first time? They might re-read it, surprised they can't find a single mention of bunnies, dyed eggs, or white sales at Macy's. Because that is what our culture thinks Easter is about: chocolate rabbits, jelly beans, and new clothes. But all this has very little to do with the actual story, because the gospel story isn't fancy; it's messy and mysterious.

Sorrow and love are light sleepers, and Luke's gospel reports that early dawn found the grieving women on their way to Jesus' tomb. The women arrived at His tomb, bringing spices they had prepared to anoint His decaying body. At the tomb, they discovered that angel hands had rolled away the stone, and Jesus' body was not there. As they stood in the empty tomb wondering what it all meant, two men in dazzling clothes appeared and asked them, "Why do you look for the living One among the dead? He is not here, He has risen." So, the women hurried back home and told the disciples, and they all threw a welcome-back party for Jesus. Well, not exactly. The disciples didn't believe them. They thought the women were freaked out by Jesus' death: that they were excitable and unreliable, and -- one of my least-favorite gender-specific adjectives -- hysterical. They thought the women were talking nonsense and told them to go take an aspirin and lie down. How's that for an underwhelming reaction to the greatest event in Christianity? Easter in the Bible may be the greatest story ever told. It's just not a story the disciples could believe in until they saw the evidence themselves. And it's not the story we usually tell, because it's not a story about new dresses and candy baskets and spring flowers. It's a story about death and disbelief and confusion. It's about the way God never seems to conform to our expectations. So, while we in churches may want to tidy up Jesus so that Easter visitors will be impressed, the God of Easter, the One who brings life out of death, doesn't want to make us impressive. God isn't satisfied with making us good or nice. God isn't about making us spiffy. God is about making us new. And new doesn't

always look perfect, with a stunning new outfit, because like the Easter story itself, new can be messy.

Thanks be to God for Easter, the Day of days. For the reminder not to seek the Living One among the dead for He is alive, and He lives in us. The One who refuses to let death have the last word over our world offers to raise us to new life every day, delivering us from the grip of disappointment and despair and inviting us to walk with Him in newness of life.

Report from Session

At the Mar 10 meeting, the following actions were taken:

- Health and Safety. Mask requirement to remain in place for time being in order to protect health of congregation and visitors. Also, policy of no indoor food preparation or eating indoors will continue.
- Easter Sunday. Easter Sunday celebration, including an Easter egg hunt, to be held in the courtyard.
- Finances. A financial advisory team has been formed to consider investment options for funds generously donated to Parkview. The team will be meeting with a financial advisor to discuss what Parkview may be able to do to help alleviate the 2022 budget deficit.
- Church Sustainability. Recent seminar by Presbyterian Church U.S.A. touched on issues of church funding and congregational giving. In order to sustain Parkview's ministry, speaker may be asked to speak to Parkview's congregation.
- Building & Grounds. A team will be created to consider usage of the Heiwa and Kansha buildings as a possible source of revenue and ministry for Parkview.

Parkview's Audio Operators

When you look at the back of the sanctuary, you will notice a large black trunk. This box houses Parkview's new state-of--the-art audio system, which was installed last year. It controls the five wireless microphones for in-house use. These



mics can be used in every location of the church. Of course, without our new speakers, this system would not be able to deliver the audio to the congregation. We have four new speakers in the sanctuary, two in the social hall and two in the kitchen. When you come to church, you will be able to hear the audio loud and clear.

We have a dedicated group of Parkview volunteers who arrive at church 30 minutes before worship and start the system up and perform microphone checks. It really is a simple process which begins with opening the box in the back, then switching on the speakers in the sanctuary and turning on the control box. That's it! We then operate the control panel during the service and adjust the audio levels of each microphone, if needed.

The current volunteers on the audio team are: Jerry Champa, Dave McGill, Cathy Nishizaki, Jonathan Sakakibara, Tom Tambara, and Titus Toyama. We want to give a special thank you to the Tambaras, who championed bringing this audio system to Parkview.
