Dear Friends,

It's summertime, and for many of us, that means traveling. Visiting family we haven't seen for too long due to Covid, or taking some destination adventures. Raise your hand if you have an aversion to packing for a trip. I see plenty of hands. But I've got both of mine raised. Before the airlines started charging for luggage, I took large suitcases crammed with way too much stuff. I'm too cheap to pay the \$50 per checked bag fee, so I now take one carry-on bag for the overhead and a "small personal item"- a canvas carryall the size of a small car.

Several years ago, our family went back to visit Monterey First Presbyterian Church where Dwight and I were pastors for eight years in the 1990s. We hadn't been back since 2001. Our daughter Chelsea asked what I was most looking forward to on the trip. "Seeing our church friends," I told her. I was also looking forward to a sourdough bread bowl filled with clam chowder at Fisherman's Wharf, and a butterfly cookie from Pacific Grove. And to smelling the celery and strawberries growing in the fields in nearby Salinas. I thought I might get nostalgic for my fluffy cat Buster, best-cat-ever, who came with us to church most Sundays when we lived in the manse next to the church. Buster even played the church organ once - he walked along the foot pedals during a sermon. Everyone applauded. Even the guest preacher, who laughed and referenced "Kitten on the Keys," Zez Confrey's jazz standard from the 20s. When we told the congregation we were moving back to Virginia to be closer to my aging parents, people understood. "We know you have to go," they said, "but can Buster stay here?" Not a chance!

One of the best parts about living in Monterey was our proximity to the water. We were a five-minute drive to the bay, and we could hear the sea lions barking when we went out on the porch to feed our dogs. When the wind shifted, we could even smell the sea lions and their fishy lunch. I don't miss that. The first word elementary-school Chelsea typed on my office computer was OTTER. Actually, she wrote OTTER OTTER OTTER. She wondered how I knew it was her. We both love otters, and sea lions, when they are downwind. We don't see many of those where we live in Prince George, Virginia, but we've got lots of deer and rabbits. During the warm summer nights, whippoorwills, which I'd never heard before, now symbolize summer in the South to me. So do fireflies. Fireflies, or lightning bugs, as we used to call them, have always seemed magical to me. I guess other folks feel the same way. That could be why groups of people gather in the last weeks of June for a spectacular light show at Richmond's Wetlands. Ralph White, former James River Park System manager, explains how to identify fireflies based on their color, blinking display, size, and flight pattern. He talks about "hotaru," fireflies in Japanese, and their importance in Japan, how they symbolize

passion and love, particularly in haiku. And when firefly habitat was lost due to urbanization in Japan, concerned citizens reclaimed the wetlands so fireflies could thrive. Then Mr. White leads firefly fans down to a low swampy field surrounded by a canopy of trees filled with summer's flashiest Christmas lights. "This is an experience in nature's theater," he says. It's a light show." All I can say is "Wow!" and, "Thank you, God!" for all the natural wonders there are to enjoy.

I loved the adventure of living in California's Lettuce Bowl, and now here I am in Sacramento, California's Farm to Fork Capital. That's what's painted on the big water tower I run past near my condo.

School of Healing Prayer Level 1 at Parkview

August 3-5, 2022

In July 2017, Dwight and I traveled to Jacksonville, FL for Christian Healing Ministries (CHM) School of Healing Prayer Level 1. Having been introduced to healing prayer at seminary years before, we were both



interested in learning more about praying for the sick. We wanted to pray as effectively as possible for our family and friends and church members, and we were exploring the idea of starting a healing ministry in the church we were serving. We spent a jam-packed three days at CHM listening to teachings on a variety of topics such as: Four Types of Healing, The Healing Power of Forgiveness, Developing Listening Skills, and Healing Our Image of God. We started and ended each day with singing and worship, participated in practicums, received hands-on training in praying for others, and received ministry ourselves during a corporate healing service. Our time in Jacksonville was informative, inspiring, and exciting! It set Dwight and me on a path of ministry of praying for those in need of God's love through healing prayer.

This summer at Parkview Church, Pastor Dwight and I, and two healing prayer ministers, Rev. Sheri Edwards and Dawn Zepernick, will offer the School of Healing Prayer Level 1 on August 3-5. The workshop will be three full days dedicated to the teaching of healing prayer through videos featuring CHM's founders, Francis and Judith MacNutt, and a class discussion format. We will follow the model of CHM's School of Healing Prayer with daily worship, prayer practicums, and hands-on training in praying for others. Cost for the workshop is \$50 for the School of Healing Prayer Founder's Edition student manual for Level 1 and \$20 for Francis MacNutt's book, Healing, which participants are asked to read before the workshop. Perhaps God is calling you to the exciting ministry of partnering with God in praying for the sick. If you are feeling drawn to learn more about Jesus' ministry of healing, the Biblical

The total raised so far from Parkview's Ukraine Benefit Concert comes to \$9,953, including the sale of ten CDs. What a surprise!!


I would like to add one more opportunity to grow
