He knew I was a cat person, even if he wasn't, so there have been numerous beloved cats in the Nave household through the years. Chelsea wrote a story about one of them when she was in 6<sup>th</sup> grade. I share Chelsea's story "Yellow-Line Valentine" with her permission:

What comes to mind when you think of cats? Frisky crow chasers? Ferocious mice catchers? Furry lap nappers? These are things we think all cats have in common, but one little black feline didn't have this spark. Why? Read on to find out. My father and I were on our way to church one Sunday morning when Daddy saw something in the road. Naturally, I didn't look, because I can't stand seeing dead animals in the road. It makes me sad inside to see them run over. My dad pulled over and got out of the car to move the cat out of the middle of the road. It was lying on the yellow center line of the highway. Was it dead? I feared the worst. Dad pulled a pair of old jeans from the trunk, and picked the cat up. I thought it was alive, because I saw its tail swishing back and forth, back and forth. My dad laid the traumatized cat in a nearby yard and went up to the door and knocked. An elderly woman came to the door, and Dad told her what happened. She told us that she had lost a few of her cats on that road. They had also been hit by the fast-moving cars.

When the cat went to the bathroom, there was no blood, so we were relieved that there was no bleeding inside. But there was a little blood on his nose, where we think he was bumped when a car ran over him. Church was getting ready to start. We had to do something with this poor injured cat. We went looking for the owner. But no one claimed him. I really didn't want to leave the poor kitty behind. So, Daddy made a wonderful decision that warmed my heart. He decided we would take the cat to church with us. I was so happy! When we got to church, we put the black cat in a box in Daddy's office. The cat slept and slept! He was so traumatized from being run over, he had to sleep it off. After church, we went to visit him in Daddy's office. He was still asleep. What should we do with him? Since we already have two cats and two dogs at home, my parents decided to let him stay at the office. We brought cat crunchies and a litter box to help him feel at home. For the next two days, my parents called around to try to find his owner. In the meantime, Mom took the black kitty to the vet to get him neutered and vaccinated so that when someone wanted to adopt him, he'd be all set to go. After we paid the big vet bill, he really became our cat. We named him Valentine, because Valentine's Day was just around the corner, and all our money for a fancy Valentine's Day dinner went to pay the vet's bill. Last, but not least, we named him Valentine because he is what we call a kitty love. He loves to be

petted, and carried around on my shoulder, and he has a sweet loud voice when he meows. When he's on his back you can pick him up, he's that kind of cat! I'm so glad he came to live at our house! The End

## News

#### **Report from Session**

At the January meeting of Session, the following actions were taken and matters discussed:

• Approval of 2023 Budget: Treasurer reviewed and Session approved the 2023 budget to be presented to the congregation at the annual meeting. The approved budget



meeting. The approved budget includes a 3% service compensation increase to \$31,050 and a housing allowance of \$41,050 for our Pastor.

- *Clerk of Session Candidate*: Terri Bowman was elected as Clerk of Session for 2023.
- *Treasurer:* Betsy Eskridge was elected as Treasurer for 2023.
- *Presbytery Meeting Representative:* Maurine Huang selected as the representative from Parkview to attend meetings of the Presbytery.
- Safety and Security Measures: Installation of a Ring security camera for the front door is being researched by the Safety and Security Team. The security camera is a recommendation from the recent safety review of the church grounds.
- *Possible Fundraiser:* A possible spring social fundraiser and raffle to be held at a local restaurant has been suggested. More information such as the cost of the meal and type of food to be researched.
- *Restart of Sunday School:* Jana Nakase-Lee has volunteered to teach Sunday school twice a month beginning on Jan 22. Curriculum to include lessons in racial equality.
- Communion Assistance: Elders will assist Pastor with communion per schedule to be established.
- Boundless Compassion Retreat: Pastor Sarah will be attending a conference from Mar 1-6, with teachings by Joyce Rupp, which will focus on listening to the compassionate heart of prayer.
- *Healing Prayer Level 2:* to be held Feb 22-24. Although this is open to those who have completed Level 1, all are invited to observe.
- *Safety and Security Events:* Active shooter instruction to be held on Jan 22, after service, and basic self-defense instruction to be held on Jan 29, after service (cost \$5).
- Session Retreat to be held on Feb 16.

### Ash Wednesday 2023 at Parkview – Imposition of Ashes at 5:00 pm

Feb 22 is Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is one of the most important dates on the Christian calendar because it marks the start of Lent. Ash Wednesday begins our sixweek journey through Lent and Holy Week to Easter. Like any well-



prepared traveler, we want to pack our bags to make sure we're ready for our journey. But Ash Wednesday is a time to be aware of our personal baggage, not the kind that fits in an airplane's overhead bin, but the baggage we rely on to get us through life. Things we'd rather not do without. Some give up things like their morning coffee or chocolate or desserts, their favorite food, TV, or social media, in order to limit their reliance upon them and increase their reliance on God. Jesus didn't just give up His morning coffee and cream cheese bagel during His forty days in the wilderness following His baptism. He gave up food completely!

Christians who want to identify with the hardships Jesus felt during those forty days may choose to give up things for Lent. Pope Francis says Lent comes providentially to reawaken us, to shake us from our spiritual lethargy. So, let's think about what it is that we may let go of this Lent, in order to hear the stories of Jesus' extravagant love for all more clearly, and follow him more closely on our spiritual journey. Since the Middle Ages, the Church has used ashes to mark the beginning of the holy season of Lent, when we turn back to God, remember our mortality and confess our sins.

You are invited to come to Parkview's sanctuary at 5:00 pm on Ash Wednesday to receive the sign of the cross in ashes on your forehead as a symbol of your love for God as we enter the season of Lent.

#### Safety Is a Top Priority at Parkview

Keeping Parkview's church family and guests safe during worship and church activities is a top priority at our church. Parkview's Safety/ Security Advisory Team members Hach Yasumura, Lois Van Beers, Maurine Huang, and William Yee



are currently identifying potential security threats and assessing our church building and congregation's vulnerability in order to devleop a security plan. Due to Parkview's history and our current intercultural church family, along with the recent increase in AAPI hate crimes, safety upgrades like outer door surveillance improvements, video equipment, additional exterior lighting, safety-compliant landscaping, and fence repair and reinforcement will be completed in coming months.

After worship on Jan 22, Sgt. Matt Young from the Sacramento Police offered an active shooter training at Parkview. Sgt Young gave a sobering power-point presentation. One key take-away was if someone comes into the building intending to do harm, it's past time for negotiation. Their mind is made up, and they will kill people until they are stopped. For Parkview's safety, we will strengthen the perimeter to lessen the opportunity for an attack. And, we will practice leaving the sanctuary through marked exits in the event of an active shooter incident. More details will follow as we prepare this practice drill.

The following Sunday, Jan 29, Mr. Kelly and Mr. Humphreys from Kovars Satori Academy in Elk Grove gave the Parkview church family a basic selfdefense class in the social hall. They informed us that no matter how young or old we are, we can always do something to defend ourselves and others. The key is having confidence and courage, which Mr. Kelly defined as being scared and doing something anyway. A key take-away from the presentation is our need to be aware. Mr. Kelly said that when you are out and about, put your phone away, look around, and pay attention to who's nearby and what's going on. If someone does threaten you, step back but stay balanced, in case things escalate. In that case, strike a vulnerable part of the person's body: nose, eyes, ears, groin, or stomp on their toes. Then we practiced palm strikes on padded mitts held by the instructors. No one wants to think of being physically attacked, but preparing ahead of time, mentally and physically, provide skills and peace of mind.

The CV-12 version of the USS Hornet was commissioned in 1943 and saw action in the WWII Pacific theater, the Vietnam War, and was the recovery ship for Apollo 11 in 1969. On board the carrier is a tribute to the men who served in the Military Intelligence Service, 100<sup>th</sup> Infantry Battalion, and the 442<sup>nd</sup> Regimental Combat Team (the 100<sup>th</sup> was absorbed into the 442<sup>nd</sup> and "Go For Broke" became its motto). The carrier was decommissioned in 1970 and berthed in Alameda as an air, sea and space museum.

#### Food Closet Seeks Donations of Supplies

Could you save your cardboard egg cartons, rubber bands, and mediumsize boxes\* for SSIP? Parkview is one of the member churches of the South Sacramento Interfaith Partnership (SSIP) that operates the food closet out of Bethany



Presbyterian Church. SSIP distributes food to the South Sacramento area and serves over 200 families each weekday.

In addition to the food from the Food Bank and the USDA, SSIP collects food donated from grocery stores and then hands it out to households. The food closet often gets big flats of eggs that volunteers split up into ½-doz. packages and secures with rubber bands. But we're running low on those supplies.
