Dear Friends,

I took a run on the levee by my house the last day of February. It was pouring rain with a high wind advisory. The cold wind blew the rain in sideways, raindrops hitting my face like wet shards of glass. I gave up complaining for Lent this year, so I'll just say the atmospheric conditions weren't conducive for a comfortable running experience. It was rain, not snow, but I immediately thought of the Iditarod. The Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race, aka the 'Last Great Race', begins this year on March 4. Each March since 1973, mushers and their dogs have made the historic trip in honor of the heroic 1925 emergency Alaskan medical mission. Thirty-four dog teams will be dashing through the snow from Anchorage to Nome this year. Here's a bit of the backstory on the Iditarod from History.com.

Children in Nome were infected with diphtheria, a lethal respiratory disease. Nome's only physician, Dr. Charles Welch, ordered a quarantine of the entire village of 1,400, but he knew the only way to ward off the fast-spreading disease was a life-saving serum. The nearest batch of serum was 1,000 miles away in Anchorage. Nome was inaccessible at that time of year by boat or open-cockpit airplanes. The nearest train station was in Nenana, a city 700 miles away. Dog sleds offered Nome the best possibility for a speedy delivery. A round-the-clock dog team relay was organized. On the night of January 27, 1925, a train whistle in the Nenana station announced the arrival of the life-saving cargo: a 20-lb. package of serum wrapped in protective fur. "Wild Bill" Shannon and his nine malamutes pounded trail on the first steps of the 694-mile "Great Race of Mercy" through the Alaskan wilderness. That night temperatures plummeted to -60°F, dangerously cold for Shannon and his dogs. If they breathed too deeply, they could frost their lungs and die. Despite running alongside the sled to keep warm, Shannon developed frostbite and hypothermia on the 52-mile leg before handing off the serum to the next dog team. More than 150 dogs and 20 drivers participated in the relay that took five-and-a-half days. Three weeks after the serum arrived in Nome, Dr. Welch lifted the quarantine. Balto, the dog that led the final miles of the relay, became a media superstar. In December 1925, a bronze statue of his likeness was unveiled in New York's Central Park. (The Naves make a pilgrimage to Balto's statue every time we're in NYC.)

A few years ago after Christmas, Dwight came up with a great way to motivate himself and other intrepid members of our family to get outside and exercise in the new year. He called it The Iditarod Challenge. The idea was, in a year's time, to walk or run 1,000 miles, the distance of the Iditarod. Our Iditarod Challenge began with great fanfare on January 1. Dwight clanged a pot with a wooden spoon – our version of a starting bell, and we ambled into the road in front of our house. The race was on! Dwight had devised a spread sheet with mileage and actual Iditarod check points for entering daily distances. Nothing says competition like racing to check points. I opted to follow my normal daily running routine to see if I could get to Nome first. In order to keep other competitors guessing who held the lead, Dwight and Chelsea kept mum about daily distances, only reporting when they reached a check point. It was a race between Dwight and his highly-competitive daughter. A race to second-place, that is. If my weekly mileage stayed on track, I'd arrive in Nome weeks ahead of them. It was great fun. Even

without sled dogs.

In addition to seeing all the dogs bounding joyfully through the snow, one of my favorite parts of the Iditarod is the Red Lantern Award. Each year the red lantern is awarded to the last-place finisher. It has become a symbol of perseverance for the Iditarod, an Alaska tradition. It reminds me of the adventuresome spirit and determination those mushers and dog teams bring to the trail. And the adventuresome, devoted spirit we need as followers of Christ. As we journey, through rain or shine, through the weeks of this Lenten season on the way to Easter, may we be encouraged by the companionship of those who walk, run, or mush alongside us. Lenten Blessings to all!


Documents Sought for JA Collection
