
Presbyterian minister and author Frederick Buechner writes this about Easter, originally published in his book, Whistling in the Dark: A Doubter's Dictionary (1993):

Christmas has a large and colorful cast of characters including not only the three principals themselves, but the Angel Gabriel, the Innkeeper, the Shepherds, the Heavenly Host, the Three Wise Men, Herod, the Star of Bethlehem, and even the animals kneeling in the straw....We have seen them represented so often that we would recognize them anywhere. The manger is as familiar as home. We have made a major production of it. With Easter, it is entirely different. The Gospels are far from clear as to just what happened. It began in the dark. The stone had been rolled aside. Matthew alone speaks of an earthquake. In the tomb there were two white-clad figures or possibly just one. Mary Magdalene seems to have gotten there before anybody else. There was a man she thought at first was the gardener. One account says Peter came too with one of the other disciples. Elsewhere the suggestion is that there were only the women and that the disciples, who were somewhere else, didn't believe the women's story when they heard it. There was the sound of people running, of voices. Confusion was everywhere.

It is not a major production at all, and the minor attractions we have created around it—the bunnies and baskets and bonnets, the dyed eggs—have so little to do with what it's all about that they neither add much nor subtract much. It's not really even much of a story when you come right down to it, and that is of course the power of it. It doesn't have the ring of great drama. It has the ring of truth. If the Gospel writers had wanted to tell it in a way to convince the world that Jesus indeed rose from the dead, they would presumably have done it with all the skill and fanfare they could muster. Here there is no skill, no fanfare. They seem to be telling it simply the way it was. The narrative is as fragmented, shadowy, incomplete as life itself. When it comes to just what happened, there can be no certainty. That something unimaginable happened, there can be no doubt.

Jesus rose. On Easter we celebrate His resurrection. The symbol of Easter is the empty tomb. We resonate with that emptiness, for we long to be filled. A person who is "full" can look at their life and say, Wow! My every need is met, every fear is silenced, and every obstacle is overcome. Most of us would say, that's what I want. That's what I'm aiming for. That's what I've been working my whole life for. Because we all want to be full? Right? If we think that we're complete, that our lives are fine as is, then this special day, this Easter message, this reality of the resurrected Christ isn't for us. Because Easter isn't for full people. It isn't for the "I-have-it-all-together" people. No. Easter is for empty people. Empty is everything. Come to worship at 10 am on Easter Sunday, April 9, to find out more.

#### **Report from Session**

Led by Pastor Sarah, the Feb 16 meeting of Session was a retreat where Session members discussed and prayed about how to best lead Parkview to a closer, loving relationship with God, Jesus Christ, and each other in the coming year.



The following business items were raised and acted upon as well:

- Approval of 2023 Mission Donation \$2,250 to be donated to the South Sacramento Interfaith Partnership (SSIP) food closet. Donation to be redirected from the Parkview Multicultural Intern Ministry account;
- Approval to Accept the California State Nonprofit Security Grant award to Parkview of \$105,700.

At the Mar 9 meeting of Session, the following matters were voted upon and/or discussed:

- Pullpit Supply Fee Increase in amount to be paid to a visiting pastor or speaker increased to \$200 from \$150;
- On-Site Alcohol Usage Policy Question raised and discussed. Pastor Sarah to provide additional information for further discussion;
- Approval of Parkview Audit Team Steve Hanway and Pattie Hashimoto approved as members;
- Treasurer's Report Our treasurer reported that the amount remaining from the funds donated in 2020 from the Presbytery, donations, and the Building Fund Account is \$8,242.94. These funds are earmarked for the safety, security, and health of the church. Treasurer also confirmed that the tiered investments in bank certificates of deposit held by Charles Schwab are continuing as previously approved by Session;
- Assistance of Police Department Pastor Sarah reported that the police department recently was very helpful in dealing with an individual who parked without permission in one of the spaces behind the church;
- Pastor's Report Pastor Sarah will conduct a Good Friday service via Zoom at 6 pm this year in lieu of the joint service usually

conducted with the Sacramento Japanese United Methodist Church. Best wishes to SJUMC's Pastor Yamada Foor, who has accepted another position within the Methodist Church.

- Pastor Sarah also reported that a very successful healing prayer level 2 workshop took place on February 22-24;
- Kitchen Stove Repair and Kansha Update Assessment – Stove to be repaired in near future. Parkview is looking for someone who can assess the condition of the Kansha house and recommend repairs and updating;
- Upcoming events Summerfest Banquet fundraiser to be held on June 25, at Lucky Jade Restaurant in Sacramento.


## April Book Club Meeting

#### God's Love Made Tangible Through Work

Thank God for South Sacramento Interfaith Partnership (SSIP), an amazing network of faith communities, business and community partners, and volunteers working together to provide superb nourishment and relief for our



neighbors with limited economic resources. Before the pandemic, the food closet served around 80 clients a day, but we now serve more than 200 a day. This past February, we gained 116 new households, and that number is expected to grow. We are taking on the growth within the same square footage and with the same number of daily volunteers. Even so, the food closet continues to be a place of joy. God's love flows from SSIP throughout the Sacramento community.

The SSIP mission expands as the need for emergency food increases. We seek more cold storage for perishable food and also space for non-perishable items; more vans for pick-ups; and larger working space for volunteers to work in. We are improving hospitality for clients with covered waiting areas. We are collaborating with community agencies (including Opening Doors, My Sister's House, La Familia, Sac City USD Family Services, WEAVE and more) to broaden food outreach.

#### Support Church World Service CROP Walk

Parkview Presbyterian Women rejoices in inviting you to join us in supporting the annual Church World Service (CWS) CROP Walk on Sunday, Apr 23 right after church.



The CWS mission is to eradicate hunger and poverty and to promote peace and justice at the national and international level through collaboration with partners abroad and in the US.

Church World Service makes it easy to join and donate. The easiest way to sign up to walk or make a donation is to go to Parkview's customized Sacramento CROP Walk website, found at:

*https://events.crophungerwalk.org/2023/team/parkview-presbyterian-church-sacramento.* If you prefer to write a check, make it out to either Parkview Presbyterian Women or Church World Service, with a notation that it is for our CROP Walk. If you are not able to participate in the walk, please consider making a donation to support Parkview's walkers. That can be done through the above link or through a check, as indicated above.

As of this writing, we are one of four teams registered for the Sacramento CROP Walk, with ten team members and \$915 already raised. We are off to a good start. Again this year, as last year, 25% of the total Sacramento CROP walk will support South Sacramento Interfaith Partnership. Last year's overall Sacramento CROP walk raised slightly under \$11,700, of which 25%, or \$2,971, went to South Sacramento Interfaith Partnership. We at Parkview raised \$3,250, the most of any team. We were one of six Sacramento teams, and with 16 participants, had the most walkers. Unlike many groups, CWS emphasizes working in partnership with local and regional ecumenical agencies. In Sacramento, it partners with Opening Doors to resettle refugees. One way CWS funds its operations and introduces people to its work is by asking local faith communities to organize CROP walks. Of the funds raised, 25% is retained locally and the remaining 75% is forwarded to Church World Service.
