Dear Friends,

I was honored to attend the Florin Manzanar Pilgrimage on April 28-30 with a group of nearly 60 others from Sacramento and the Bay Area. It was an amazing experience. Titus and Donna (Komure) Toyama invited me to join the 15th annual 3-day pilgrimage from Sacramento to Manzanar National Historic Park to help me better understand the Japanese American WWII experience. Dozens of Parkview members have attended the pilgrimage through the years. On Friday morning we met the bus in the parking lot of the Florin Buddhist Church, the same lot where, during WWII, 600 members of the Florin community were forcibly removed to Manzanar. Gathering in the space where US government-sanctioned racial injustice devastated Japanese American families was a heart-rending beginning to our pilgrimage. Our group was comprised of former WWII incarcerees and their family members, Muslim Americans, a terrific Taiko drum group, local college students, and others involved in civil and human rights efforts in our area. The 3-day pilgrimage was a blend of cultural and religious exchange, education, and fellowship. With lots of snacks, laughter, and interesting discussions. And an entertaining bus trivia game. The pilgrimage was organized by the Florin Japanese American Citizens League–Sacramento Valley (Florin JACL-SV) and the Council on American Islamic Relations-Sacramento Valley/Central California (CAIR-SV/CC).

After a 3-year Covid hiatus, this year Andy Noguchi and a dedicated leadership team brought together people from a variety of backgrounds to honor and remember the past, address the injustices of the present, and work toward a future that includes justice for all groups suffering systemic injustices. Stan and Christine Umeda, Judy Fukuman, Titus and Donna (Komure) Toyama, Betsy Eskridge and I attended from Parkview. I had learned very little about the Japanese incarceration camps in my VA textbooks. The pilgrimage gave me an opportunity to learn of the suffering endured at the camps, through an on-site museum exhibit, and by hearing stories from five camp survivors: Stan and Christina Umeda, Judy Fukuman, Sam Shimada, and Sachi Louie. Their resilience and willingness to stand with others who are being targeted by discrimination and racial hatred is both humbling and inspiring. On our tour of the Manzanar camp, I was impressed that, even with the hardships, there were accomplishments like growing much of the food they ate and the creation of beautifully landscaped gardens. It is vital that this disturbing chapter in US history be taught in our schools. One survivor said incarceration at the camp caused her family such pain that many of them rejected speaking Japanese again or learning Japanese culture.

The original Manzanar Committee members dedicated their lives to creating the Manzanar National Historic Park because "for decades, no one spoke of the camp experience."

They first began with "talking and sharing the story, which led to healing within the Japanese American community." Years later, the "Redress Movement," provided an official apology from the U.S. government and payment of \$20,000 to survivors of the camps. The Civil Liberties Act of 1988 acknowledged that the injustices of the camps were driven by "race prejudice, war hysteria, and a failure of political leadership." Japanese Americans are now teaching the world about the injustice of the incarceration camps and offering support to Muslim Americans who have been targeted since the World Trade Center attacks on 9/11. They also form partnerships with Indigenous Americans in their fight to preserve their land, protect sacred places, natural resources, and historical culture.

Sue Kunitomi arrived at Manzanar in May 1942, at age 19. Years later, Sue Kunitomi Embrey was the driving force behind the Manzanar Committee. She worked to ensure that this site and its stories would be preserved to protect the human and civil rights of all. "Manzanar should become a monument to our core values of democracy and civil rights," Embrey said. "Our message is simple: Speak out, demand equal justice under the law for everyone, no matter who they are or where they come from." Amen!

Report from Session

At the April 13 meeting of Session, the following matters were voted upon and/or discussed:

- Calif. State Nonprofit Security
 Grant Program resolution
 passed authorizing Maurine
 Huang, Elizabeth Eskridge, and
 Lois Van Beers to act as the authorized agents on
 behalf of Parkview on matters related to the
 security grant program;
- Parkview to Support Loomis United Church of Christ and Pastor Casey Tinnin – voted to send letter of support and \$200 donation to UCC's church security fund and LGBTQ youth program fund. The Loomis church and Pastor Tinnin and his family have been threatened for supporting LGBTQ youth;
- Parkview's Handbook Policy Updates and Revisions – discussed need to update the policies in the near future;
- Summerfest Fundraiser Report approved Parkview's setting up of a PayPal account to

- facilitate purchase of tickets and donations for fundraiser to be held at the Lucky Jade Restaurant on June 25, 2023, at 4:30 p.m.;
- Presbyterian Church (USA) Matthew 25
 Congregation voted to become a Matthew 25
 church which means that Parkview desires to build congregational vitality and works to dismantle structural racism and systemic poverty. There is no cost to the church and the Matthew 25 principles will be listed on Parkview's website;
- Mariners and Jujikai Adult Worship Groups at recent meeting of Mariners, they discussed whether the two groups should combine. Jujikai members will be contacted and polled;
- Thank You Protocols Revised donation acknowledgments will no longer be sent to church members who receive an accounting of their donations at the end of every calendar year. This change will result in cost savings for Parkview;
- Updates and Reports: Pastor Sarah will be attending the Manzanar pilgrimage on April 30 and Pastor Doug Able will preach in her place; church exit drill to be scheduled on a Sunday in the near future; Healing Prayer Level 3 training to be held July 5-7; kitchen stoves repaired at a cost of \$900.

Since Igor and Mira Veligan lived in Odessa for six years while studying at Odessa State Conservatory, they made an effort to directly contact someone in the city of Odessa. This is the detailed report I received from Mira:


"The situation in May, 2022 was so critical in that city since there were heavy battles there. It is close to Russia. Lots of wounded soldiers were in the hospitals but the government could not help them at all. We had the direct contact with Andrey Tantsyura, who is the leader of the volunteers there. Therefore, with that money, they bought lots of VAC machines, machines for wound care and treatment. Money also went for many other medical supplies and to buy an old van to move wounded soldiers from the battle field to the hospitals. It was extremely helpful since there was not enough transportation. Thank you so much for the help from the people in your church! They are so amazing!!"

She also sent me a video of a wounded soldier. This is the translation of his words from Ukrainian. "Good day. I am Serhiy. I got injured on the battlefield near city Kherson. Right now, I am in the hospital in Odessa. I would like to thank Ukrainian Heritage Club in Northern California for money for my medication, treatment, and surgery. Glory to Ukraine!"
