Dear Friends,

At Jane Matsuoka's celebration of life service at Parkview on June 3, Judy Fukuman and Kris Sazaki provided a beautiful slideshow featuring photos of Jane's life. One of the songs accompanying the slideshow was "Seasons of Love" from the Broadway musical *Rent*, Jonathan Larson's contemporary retelling of Puccini's opera, "La Bohème." The first stanzas of the song go like this:

Five hundred twenty-five thousand, six hundred minutes Five hundred twenty-five thousand moments so dear Five hundred twenty-five thousand, six hundred minutes How do you measure, measure a year?

In daylights, in sunsets, in midnights, in cups of coffee
In inches, in miles, in laughter, in strife
In five hundred twenty-five thousand, six hundred minutes
How do you measure a year in the life? How about love? Measure in love. Seasons of love.

As relatives and friends remarked on Jane's legacy of kindness at her service, it was clear that Jane's nearly ninety-nine years were overflowing with many seasons of love. Jane lived and loved well, and we are all blessed to have known her. Thinking of Jane's life of love might get us thinking about how we measure up when it comes to sharing love. There's a story in Luke's gospel about a rich man whose seasons of life weren't defined by love. He isn't named in the story, but the poor man who lay at his gate was named Lazarus. Jesus' way of getting his message across was to tell a story, and this one is pretty awful all the way around. Here's part of the story in Luke 16.

There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. And at his gate lay a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who longed to satisfy his hunger with what fell from the rich man's table.

In a sermon on this passage, Barbara Brown Taylor says that each of us has things that we tell ourselves to protect us from the pain of those around us. If only he had not dropped out of high school. If only she had not had so many babies. If he would just learn more English. If she would just stop drinking. It's human nature to find some reason why people are the way they are. We are here on earth to love our neighbors, but changing their lot in life is up to

them, not us. At times it seems that the gap between the front runners in life and those who start from so far back they don't even know which way to run is so wide it can't be crossed. A chasm, is the way the Bible describes it. So, when we hear this awful story, most of us head right into our own pit of guilt, even though that's not the point. The point of the story is to tell us a truth we need to know in hopes that it will change our lives. How?

Barbara Brown Taylor reminds us: this story is for us, not against us. The people in the story were satisfied with sumptuous feasts when God wanted to give them the kingdom. They were content to live in the world with beggars when God wanted to give them

brothers and sisters. What they didn't seem to know is that they, and we, are causalities of our own way of life. When we cut ourselves off from each other, when we learn how to live with the misery of other people by convincing ourselves that there's not much we can do, then we are the ones who lose. Not because of what God will do to us, but because of what we've done to ourselves. We've forgotten that we belong to each other.

There are no easy answers to addressing the issues of the increasing numbers of unhoused people in Sacramento and other cities. Joseph and the guys camped out front by the Parkview sign will likely need to relocate. But how we talk to them in the process, how we move them along, makes all the difference. It gives a message to them, the wider community, and to ourselves about Parkview Church.

If you read on in Luke 16, the best thing about this story is that it isn't over yet. For the rich man, yes, but not for us. We are the five brothers he left behind. We are the ones the rich man is trying to get a message to, to tell us to see the poor man as a fellow human being. He missed his chance to do that. But it's not too late for us to see how our lives are quilted together with all God's children. How do you measure a year in the life? How about love? As we sort through these complex human issues, let's listen to Jesus, and to each other, as we navigate these holy moments.

Report from Session

At the May 11 meeting of Session, the following matters were voted upon and/or discussed:

- Request from Adventist Church to rent Parkview on Saturdays from 8am to 4 pm after discussion about the various factors that need consideration, including Parkview's needs, the matter was continued for future discussion.
- Parkview Support of Loomis United Church of Christ and Pastor Casey Tinnin – total of \$600 (Parkview funds of \$200 and individual donations of \$400) sent in support of UCC's church security fund and LGBTQ youth program fund, along with letter of support.
- Safety and Security Grant Update Committee is now seeking vendors who can advise and install cameras and updated lighting to enhance church security. Work to be completed by end of 2024.

- Summerfest Fundraiser Report as of this date, 50 tickets have been sold for fundraiser to be held at the Lucky Jade Restaurant on June 25, 2023, at 4:30 p.m. [As of June 4, 110 tickets have been sold.]
- Memorial Service for Jane Matsuoka to be held on June 3, 2023, at 11 am. Possibly 80 people will attend and family has asked for assistance with serving refreshments.
- Mobile Shower Ministry Request Be Encouraged Inc., a faith based non-profit, has approached Parkview about using our parking spaces to host a mobile shower trailer for use by the homeless. Matter continued for future discussion as Session had several questions. Pastor Sarah will request further information from Be Encouraged.
- Sacramento Pride Festival, June 10-11 Voted to approve Parkview's participation in the parade to be held on June 11, at 11 am and to pay the entry fee.
- Camper on Lawn Near Parkview Signage Session member volunteered to contact home assistance agency for camper.
- Pastor Sarah on Vacation May 21 to May 31. Rev. Steve Smith will preach on May 28. Donna Komure-Toyama and Titus Toyama volunteered to assist with memorial candle ceremony.
- Healing Prayer Level 3 to be held July 5-8 at Parkview.
- Building and Grounds Issues we are still looking for a contractor or someone with construction experience who can conduct a walk-through of the Kansha house and recommend repairs. Discussion about items stored in the garage, Heiwa, and kitchen continued.
