Dear Friends,

I like to mow the lawn. Lots of folks like to dig in the dirt, plant flowers or cultivate vegetable gardens and fruit trees. Not me. There is no green in my thumbs. But I do like to cut grass. Maybe it's because I didn't own a home with a lawn until after age 40. I was happy to let Dwight mow the lawn when it belonged to the landlord. But now that our name is on the mortgage papers, my hands are on the steering wheel of the riding mower. We don't have one of those fancy mowers with precision turning levers. We have a 22-year-old black Murray 21 HP mower that Dwight tunes up each spring. He sharpens the blades and checks the plugs, recharges the battery and tightens the bolt to keep the platform from dragging. With Dwight tending to it, the mower still runs well. Well, at least it did until the belt broke, again. This summer Dwight's been mowing the nearly 3 acres around our house by hand. That's a workout. I did it a few times, just for 'fun.' I was glad to climb back on the riding mower. When I stopped by to visit Carla and Loy Hart recently, Loy said he'd mowed the grass that afternoon. In the August heat. I was mighty impressed. I could almost smell the fresh-cut grass.

Mowing the lawn gives you time to look around at the beauty of God's creation, and it gives you time to think. And pray. For things on your mind and for people you love. For our world that struggles violently with issues of diversity and racism, poverty, and meanness. For global economic equity, so that everyone has food to eat, a place to live that's safe, and a yard with grass to mow, if they want one. Mowing the lawn also gives me something I don't get much in my line of work. Measurable results. Riding around the yard, row by row, I can see a salad of thick grass, complete with mushrooms, transformed into a manicured yard again. But how do you quantify increased devotion to God? By the amount of time spent reading the Bible and praying? Perhaps. By loving actions and forgiveness freely offered? Absolutely. But much of the spiritual life is hidden. It's been described as a process, a journey. As mystery.

Mowing the lawn is predictable. You cut the grass, it looks and smells great, you get something cold to drink, you're done. The spiritual life is more like the ocean, with shifting tides. Our passion for God ebbs and flows, our commitment to spiritual practices revs up or fades away, depending on the day, or the year. It's not easy to know if we're deepening in faith, hope, and love. So often the work of God's Spirit in us happens quietly and gradually. Life is unpredictable; there are many unanswered questions and lots of suffering out there. In the midst of it all, we as the Church work to nurture the spiritual life of those around us, to feed the hunger for meaning so apparent in our world.

Maybe that's why, as a pastor, I'm so fond of the line in *The Little Prince* by Antoine de Saint-Exupery: "It is only with the heart that one can see rightly, what is essential is invisible to the eye." Here's to satisfying joys like mowing the lawn, and opportunities to enhance the lives of the world community with God's saving grace, justice and peace.

Report from Session

At the August 10 meeting of Session, the following matters were voted upon and/or discussed:

- Security Grant Program William Yee updated Session on efforts to install equipment to improve church security. Session approved a motion authorizing William to execute a contract with a surveillance camera vendor to purchase and install camera equipment for an amount not to exceed \$35,000. The contract will provide for the
- Temporary Fence In late July, early August, the wooden fence surrounding Parkview was vandalized. Session approved a motion authorizing Parkview to lease temporary metal fencing for 6 months from Blain Stumpf Construction Fence Rental in the amount of \$785.80. In the meantime, efforts will be taken to research and hire a contractor to install permanent fencing;

installation of 7 cameras and include a license for

- Workers Compensation Insurance In order to avoid overlapping insurance coverage, Session approved a motion to cancel Parkview's existing policy with the State Fund as Parkview now has coverage through its new carrier, Church & Casualty Insurance;
- Money Market Fund Account In anticipation of the funds that will be needed to pay for the security upgrades to the church, Session approved a motion authorizing the church treasurer to open a money market fund account with Charles Schwab. The account will be funded from the proceeds of an existing certificate of deposit that soon will mature and will provide liquidity to pay for the upgrades;
- What does it mean to be a Matthew 25 Church? –
 Pastor Sarah led us in a discussion of what
 Matthew 25 asks us to do as Christians. Further
 discussion about compassion will follow. Session
 will also follow-up with the Be Encouraged Shower
 Ministry asking if Session members can visit that
 ministry in action;
- Date for Church Evacuation Drill September 24, more information to follow;
- Pastor and Session Reports Pastor Sarah is exploring a weekly time for prayers and discussion in order to discern Parkview's direction. The Healing Prayer Team is ready to serve and is considering how best to meet the needs of the congregation; Donna Komure-Toyama explained

- what is being planned for our annual Aloha Sunday celebration set for August 20;
- City Management Training Request by Office Manager Session approved a request by our office manager to enroll in a city management course that will be given in the fall and will be taken on the office manager's own time. The fee, to be paid by Parkview, is \$50;
- Upcoming Events Asian Community Center's Ohana Walk to take place on September 16. Parkview will staff a table in order to provide water and church information to passing walkers; My Sister's House Fun Run set for October 28 and Parkview will have a team; in October, Pastor Grace Suwabe will be offering training to lay persons interested in learning how to conduct communion (more information to follow).

Some of the things mentioned which those present had appreciated included the overall organization of the event, the sense that everyone was working together toward a common goal, God's spirit of joy throughout the evening, reuniting with old friends and meeting new people, the line dancing, the terrific MC, the silent auction/marketplace, the overall quality of the food, the entertainment, and the abundant and delicious cookie bags.

Specific gratitude was expressed regarding the skill of our master of ceremonies Jonathan Sakakibara and the quality of the entertainment – dancers Rieko Ivaska and Miyo Uchida and singers Kishwer Vikaas, Leah Nishizaki, and Kashan Vikaas.

On July 12, 2023, seven Parkview members completed the third level of Healing Prayer training and were commissioned as a team to pray for the sick and those seeking God's loving presence. Beginning in August 2022, Carla Hart, Terri Bowman, Janet Hill,



Donna Komure-Toyama, Sue Lorens, Haruko Sakakibara, and Judy Yee met at Parkview with facilitators Rev. Dwight Nave and Pastor Sarah, Rev. Sheri Edwards, and Dawn Zepernick to learn about the Biblical basis for healing prayer and how to pray for healing as effectively as possible.

During three five-day sessions in 2022 and 2023, the group studied Jesus' healing ministry and learned about physical, inner, and spiritual healing prayer. Discussions and feedback based on handouts and workbooks, videos and lectures, and practicums with the group and facilitators made these class sessions lively and memorable. The group enjoyed eating meals together and praying for each other.
