Dear Friends,

The past months have featured so much heart-breaking news about devastating events around the world. Hearing of all the continuing violence and suffering can feel overwhelming. I hope the following insights about adversity from Rev. Peter Gomes encourage you to consider how you can bring God's resilient love and strength wherever you are in the midst of our troubled world.

Reverend Peter J. Gomes was an American Baptist minister, who, in 1970, became the Plummer Professor of Christian Morals at Harvard Divinity School and the first black minister at the university's Memorial Church. He gave the benediction at President Ronald Reagan's second inauguration in 1985. Gomes was one of America's most prominent spiritual voices for tolerance. He came out in 1991 and used his national celebrity as a "gay minister" to make the religious case for LGBTQ people. Gomes became a Democrat in 2007 after decades as a conservative Republican. He died at age 68 in 2011. A friend and I heard Rev. Gomes give an evening lecture at the University of Richmond, VA the year before he died.

The following are excerpts from Rev. Gomes' sermon, "Outer Turmoil; Inner Strength", which he preached at Harvard two weeks after September 11, 2001. His text is the second verse of the second chapter of the book of Ecclesiastes, "Set a straight course and keep to it, and do not be dismayed in the face of adversity."

The symbolism of the cross makes it clear, that those who have been baptized into Christ must bear the cross, and that the cross is a sign not of ease or of victory or of prosperity or of success, but of sorrow, suffering, pain, and death and by it those things are overcome. It is important to remember that. The symbol of our Christian faith is this very cross that you see on that holy table, hung from our sanctuary ceiling, worn around the necks of many of us and held in honour and esteemed by all of us; and it stands to remind us of the troubles of the world that placed our Saviour upon it for sins that he did not commit. We Christians, therefore, ought to expect trouble, turmoil, and tribulation as the normal course of life. We don't, however; and we have been seduced by a false and phony version of the Christian faith which suggests that by our faith we are immune to trouble.

Because we have been nice to God, our thinking goes, then God should be nice to us. Because you have interrupted your normal routine and come to worship today, God should somehow take note of it, mark it down in the book, and spare you any trouble, tribulation, turmoil or difficulty. Tribulation, we know, happens only to bad people –Tribulation happens only to the non-observant and the bad people; and when, as Rabbi Kushner so famously and quite profitably noted, bad things happen to good people, we feel that something has gone terribly wrong. God is not supposed to behave that way, we think, for that is not part of the deal; and we ask, "Where is God?" Now, let me hasten to say that the answer to that conundrum is not a false conception of God. The issue has nothing what-so-ever to do with the so-called 'death of God', and everything to do with the life and the faith of the believer. It is not the death of God that should concern us; it is the questionable state of the life of the believer.

God does not spare us from turmoil, which even the most casual observance of the Scriptures tells us: God strengthens us for turmoil, and we can find that in the Good Book as well. It is a shabby faith that suggests that God is to do all the heavy lifting and that you and I are to do none. The whole record of Scripture from Genesis to Revelation, and the whole experience of the people of God from Good Friday down to and beyond Tuesday, September 11 th , suggest that faith is forged on the anvil of human adversity. No adversity; no faith...

What is the response for calamity? Endurance. Don't rush, don't panic. What are we to do in calamitous times? We are to slow down. We are to inquire. We are to endure. Tribulation does not invite haste; it invites contemplation, reflection, perseverance, endurance...When in the midst of turmoil and calamity you seek the inner strength that helps you not only to endure but to overcome, do not look for what you can get: look rather for what you have been given, and for what you can give. We begin with calamity, but we end with compassion.

I thank God for Rev. Peter Gomes' profound spiritual wisdom and guidance. In these tumultuous times of war and flood and political uncertainty, may God build strong, enduring faith and hope in us all.

News

September Report from Session

At the September 12, 2024 meeting of Session, the following matters were reported, voted upon, and/or discussed:



- **Fencing Contract.** Session voted to approve the contract with Controlled Access Consultants, Inc. (aka Ornamental Iron Outlet) to install wrought iron fencing around the church for an amount up to \$40,000. Parkview is the recipient of a safety and security grant from the state which will cover the cost of the fence. The fencing plans finally were approved by the city in early September;
- **Surveillance Camera Quote.** Parkview received a quote from Digital Dreams for the installation of 7 surveillance cameras around the perimeter of the church. Session agreed that surveillance of the entire perimeter of the church is necessary to ensure the security of the church grounds. Session thanks William Yee and Lois Van Beers for their work on the fencing and camera installations;
- **Rev. Rola Al Ashkar's Residence in Kansha House.** Session approved a one-month extension, through January 31, 2025, for Rev. Rola to continue living in the Kansha House;
- **Maurine Huang as Parkview's Elder Commissioner to the North Central California Presbytery.** Maurine's tenure as Parkview's elder commissioner will end on December 31, 2024. Session agreed to her re-election in December and thanks her for her diligent service to both Parkview and the Presbytery for the past 6 years;
- **5th Sunday Sabbath.** Based upon congregational feedback, Session agreed to revisit the idea of foregoing service in any month where a 5th Sunday occurs, beginning in 2025. More in-depth discussion and information will be forthcoming;
- **Ethical Conduct Policy.** North Central California Presbytery recently adopted an ethics policy. This policy was shared with Session and further discussion will occur on whether the policy will be adopted by Parkview;
- **Piano Information.** Our piano tuner recently advised Parkview that the piano in the Heiwa is far superior in sound quality to the piano in the social hall. After discussion, Session agreed that Parkview's pianists will be asked for their opinion on whether the piano in the Heiwa should be

moved into the social hall and, if so, what should be done with the piano currently in the social hall;

- **Item for Future Discussion.** Tribute Garden idea as suggested by Christine Umeda.

Parkview was also represented in the post-walk entertainment, with Bill Nagata, Jack Sakai, and William Yee contributing their musical talents.

Kudos to all the walkers, and special thanks to Carol Sakai for recruiting walkers, Donna Komure-Toyama for coordinating the checkpoint station, and Jonathan Sakakibara for photography. Parkview's participation in the ACC Ohana Walk – our third year in a row – is one of the many ways that we support ACC's mission to enhance the quality of life for our seniors.

One nice side benefit was being able to interact with staff members from other churches, as we were grouped together by profession. The presbytery’s goal is to train all clergy and staff.




I am happy (and relieved) to report that Parkview has never had a situation so tricky as the ones we discussed in the training! I appreciate this opportunity to learn more and to work at becoming a more effective office manager.

My Sister's House: A History

My Sister's House achieved its non-profit status in 2001. However, the organization's roots began in the late 1990's. It was initiated by the Asian Resources, Inc (ARI) with its director, May O. Lee. ARI's staff member, Carol Ching, made several trips to learn about the Asian Women's Shelter in San Francisco. Carol met with three volunteer women on a weekly basis at the ARI's office. They had the same passion to create community services for Asian battered women. This passion was designed to serve Asian bilingual/bicultural access for services. With their permission, I participated in their planning. As the Asian Liaison Social Worker for the Sacramento County Department of Social Welfare, I, too, saw the need for this specialized service.



In early 2000, My Sister's House started a campaign to raise funds. In 2003 they received grants to start work training programs for their clients and to fund a six-bed shelter home, and a Domestic Training Program. In November, 2003, Run For Safe Haven was born. Parkview members have always supported the beginnings of the many non-profit organizations in Sacramento serving the Asian community, and, My Sister's House was one of them.

For those pets who might not be able to travel to attend the service in person, their humans have the option of bringing a photo of the animal to be blessed. This service serves as a reminder that the animals in our lives are gifts from God. 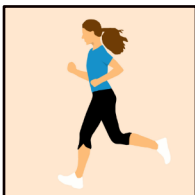
