Pastor Sheri and I had a lovely time greeting voters at the second polling station we served; the first one told us to take a hike. They didn't recognize our organization and were being vigilant. We were glad they were protecting the voters. No incidents where we were, though two GA precincts received bomb threats that day. It was meaningful to see democracy at work. Thanks again for all your support.

#### Dear Friends,

November is traditionally known as a time of gratitude. With Thanksgiving on the fourth Thursday of November each year, we're encouraged to count our blessings all month, (all year) long. This November, I'm grateful for the opportunity that my friend Rev. Sheri Edwards and I had to spend Election Day 2024 as one of the hundreds of nonpartisan poll chaplains and peacekeepers stationed outside national polling places to ensure people feel empowered to exercise their right to vote. In our country, voter suppression efforts, disinformation, and violent rhetoric have undermined people's confidence in the process and damaged their sense of security. In October, Sheri and I received training as poll chaplains from Faiths United to Save Democracy (FUSD), which operates the nation's largest poll-chaplain initiative. The Rev. Adam Russell Taylor, one of the leaders of FUSD, said, "Protecting the rights of voters is something that should matter to all Americans. We want to be messengers of truth, combatting disinformation and providing moral witness around the need to finish this election in a way that is fair and safe." So, our mission in Atlanta on Tuesday, November 5, is to be a calming and moral presence, to answer questions about the voting process, and to use de-escalation techniques to deal with any efforts to harass or intimidate voters.

Marc Ramirez wrote an article about poll chaplains

in USA TODAY on Oct 27, 2024 entitled, "Poll Chaplains' National Mission: To Protect the Sacred Right to Vote." Ramirez mentioned Bridget Moix, who served as a poll chaplain in Ohio in 2022. She recalled being outside a Cincinnati area polling site when a young Black man approached the site nervously before going inside. When he finally exited, she said, his demeanor had completely transformed, all smiles.

"Looks like that went well," she told him as he passed. "Yeah," she recalled him replying. "I thought there would be guys with guns here." "That stuck with me," said Moix, general secretary for Friends Committee on National Legislation, a Quaker peace and equality organization that is among Faiths United to Save Democracy's national partners. Ramirez reported that along with Arizona and Ohio, the FUSD's campaign's approximately 1,000 poll chaplains and peacekeepers will target key zip codes in eight other battleground states – Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Michigan, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Texas and Wisconsin – where Election-Day problems are believed to be more likely. "This is about making sure the sacred right to vote is safeguarded for everyone, particularly the most vulnerable," said Barbara Williams-Skinner, Skinner Leadership Institute's cofounder and CEO. "The right to vote has become overly politicized," said Rev. Adam Russell Taylor, of Sojourners. "We want to restore faith in the elective system and make the right to vote a moral and bipartisan cause." Sites selected to be staffed by poll chaplains are within zip codes identified as vulnerable locations, usually impoverished areas where voter suppression efforts

like new voter identification requirements or barriers to mail-in voting have occurred, or where threats of violence have taken place.

In Georgia, the Rev. Cynthia Hale worries about the threat of violence given the political atmosphere. In 2020, she said, "We had situations where men have driven by in pickup trucks with guns in the back, and we don't know how far those threats are going to go. It's a consequential election, and our democracy is on the line. I have confidence that our secretary of state has done everything possible to make sure we have a safe, free, and fair election." That kind of accountability is crucial, she said, especially given the accusations of voter fraud that followed the 2020 election in Georgia. Such disinformation remains rampant, despite multiple audits that showed no evidence of wrongdoing.

Rev. Hale said principles of justice and equality align with major faith teachings of love for God and one's neighbor. "Voting is a precious gift that has been given to us as Americans, and as people of faith it's important for us to make sure everyone has the opportunity to participate in a safe and fair way." Rev. Sheri and I join with our Parkview Church family in taking seriously God's mandate to protect the most marginalized. We know it's often poor voters who are targeted with voter suppression tactics. When more people are able to freely exercise their "sacred right" to vote, our democracy is stronger, and we all benefit.

#### October Report from Session

At the October 24, 2024 meeting of Session, the following matters were reported, voted upon, and/or discussed:



- South Sacramento Interfaith
  Partnership (SSIP): Session voted to reaffirm
  Parkview's relationship with the SSIP food closet
  program for 2025. The amount of the mission
  donation in support of SSIP will be determined
  when the 2025 budget is discussed and approved.
- NCCP Representative: Session voted to approve Maurine Huang as Parkview's 2025 Representative on the North Central California Presbytery. Session is grateful for Maurine's interest in and willingness to serve on the Presbytery.

- 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday Sabbath: Session and Pastor Sarah agreed that an informational meeting with the congregation will be set soon to discuss the pros and cons of the proposal of foregoing service in any month where a 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday occurs, beginning in 2025.
- Ethical Conduct Policy: Session discussed the North Central California Presbytery's recently adopted ethics policy and has further questions. As such, Pastor Sarah will contact the Presbytery for further information about the current need for such a policy and why church leadership within the Presbytery are also being asked to adopt the ethics policy;
- **Piano Information**: Session decided not to move the pianos that are currently in the social hall and Heiwa.
- Wrought Iron Fence and Surveillance Cameras Installation: The fence installation is set to begin on October 29 and camera installation in November. These installations are financed by the security grant.
- Mariners Movie Night Event: \$1,355 raised with the proceeds to be split between Serve L.A. and Mercy Pedalers in Sacramento. In addition, youth from Wind Youth will be able to visit Parkview and choose donated items of warm clothing.
- Pastor's Report: Pastor Sarah will travel to Atlanta to serve as a poll chaplain in the upcoming election from November 3-6. Session wishes her safe travels.

- 2. Possible renaming of Parkview Presbyterian Church to Parkview Church.
- 3. Updating of church policy manual.
