Dear Friends,

You remember how your mom or grandpa always used to tell you, "Watch where you're going!" That's good advice! I should've been watching where I was going when I stepped onto a parking curve as I was returning from the recycling dumpster, and sprained my foot. I immediately thought, "Ouch, that hurt," and "I'm not gonna get my 10,000 steps in today." Later, I amended that to "I'm not gonna be able to run tomorrow." It was weird because only a few hours earlier I'd been talking to our daughter Chelsea about the 2025 Nave family challenge: who can get the most 10,000-step days in January. She said when she goes out to walk, her injured knee hurts and she has to stop. I sympathized with her. A couple hours later, I empathized with her. I felt sore and grumpy. Lots of people live with chronic physical pain, and I don't know how they manage. I've been going for a daily run for forty-plus years; it's part of my routine, and my identity. Accidental injuries and plunging into a brandnew year brings up philosophical questions. What is life about? What am I meant to be doing in my time on earth? Do I to need to make changes? In his book, Called, Mark Labberton, former president of Fuller Seminary in Pasadena writes:

People ask many questions about how their lives relate to the world. Why are we here? What are our lives in this world about? Is there a reason we are alive, and if so, how do we know what that is? These questions can be brought on by beauty and joy but also by the daunting facts of our own lives or of the world around us. We look around in doubt, in pain, in suffering. These are questions asked throughout history by those inside and outside the church.

I heard an interview on NPR with National Geographic explorer Dan Buettner, who has been probing the question of longevity and living fulfilling lives for decades. For a Netflix documentary series, Buettner traveled to several Blue Zones, longevity hotspots all over the world, and met people who are living longer, happier lives. One of those places is in Okinawa, Japan. That's where, Buettner said, avoiding loneliness is crucial.

When you're a little kid in Okinawa, your parents put you into a circle with three or four other friends, and you're expected to travel through life. It originated actually as sort of

an alternative to a bank. You pooled money, and then when things got tough, the person who needed the money got the pool. But now it's evolved into a really strong, committed social circle, usually four or five friends who they can count on on a bad day. And, you know, we have this loneliness epidemic here in the United States. About 25% of us are lonely, which means we don't have three friends we can count on on a bad day. And loneliness is as bad as a cigarette habit. And here we have an entire culture that just doesn't have to worry about that. Friendship comes with mother's milk.

In this new year, if you're asking questions about longevity and how to make the most of your time on earth, I invite you to put yourself in a place to discover some meaningful answers. Let's study Scripture on Sunday mornings during worship and Tuesday evenings (via Zoom) and learn about God's call for all of us to a loving connection with God and God's world, a call to live and receive God's love and purpose for us and for the world. Let's eat, laugh, and fellowship. Let's work and worship together and explore a Biblical call meant to pack our lives with more love, more joy, more creativity, more wonder, and more engagement. God created us as partners to reflect God's image and care for creation. We are meant to be tangible evidence of God's intent for the world. Us together. The church. This is the purpose of human life; this is our calling as followers of Jesus. See you in church! Grateful to be on the journey with you.

News

December Report from Session

At the December 12, 2024 meeting of Session, the following matters were reported, voted upon, and/or discussed:



- Book Signing and Mochi Making Event: Session voted to ratify an earlier email vote approving author Sharon Fujimoto-Johnson's attendance at Parkview for a book signing and mochi making event in January;
- Non-Pursuit of Criminal Restitution: Session voted to ratify an earlier email vote declining to seek restitution from Joseph Rodolf who was cited in July for vandalizing the church fence;
- Restart of Garbage Pick-up: the monthly cost of garbage pick-up for the church is \$304.08 (trash, recycling, organic waste). Parkview may be able to have the cost of the organic waste pick-up waived because we have a gardening service. Office manager to follow-up;
- Storage Space Needed: Rev. Rola Al Ashkar's outreach ministry involving the practice of Yoga is scheduled to begin in January. We are still looking for a place to store a large mirror and other equipment;
- Hawaiian Blessing for Fence and Other Security Items: This special blessing will take place at the congregational meeting on January 19;
- Wrought Iron Fence and Installation of Surveillance Cameras: The installation of the fence and cameras are both over 99% completed;
- Human Resources Team: Various members of the team have met with Pastor Sarah, Office Manager Kris, and Choir Conductor Ben;
- Nominating Team: Members of the team have met to nominate the 2027 class of elders;
- 2025 Pledges: Pastor Sarah reported that as of December 12, Parkview has received 22 pledges which total \$68,460;
- Reimbursement of Air Fare: Session voted to authorize the payment of air fare incurred by Pastor Sarah as continuing education for her work as a poll chaplain in Georgia during the November election;
- 2025 Budget Discussion and Action: Session voted to increase mission giving to the SSIP food closet program from \$5,000 to \$6,000; Session voted to authorize two additional hours per month,

as needed, for Office Manager Kris, and a 3% increase in salary for Kris and Choir Conductor Ben; Session also voted to authorize a salary increase of 3.5% for Pastor Sarah. Budget discussion to continue in January.



Parkview has ramped up its security, but there are still a few things we need to monitor. We are currently looking for volunteers who would be willing to have the alarm company call you when the church alarm is set off. You would have



access to the security cameras and could see if anyone was on the property. You would call the police and potentially meet them at the church. During the day, you would probably just need to reset the alarm. We hope to have four people on the list so that no one person has sole burden of being available for calls.

Since installing the alarm, we have had one break in at night, but the burgler ran off after hearing the alarm. This occurred when we had no fencing around the property. We had one call during the day, and that was when one door was inadvertently left unlocked. The alarm scared off the poor parishioner from the church next door!

Now with the fencing up and the gates locked, we don't anticipate any problems. We just want to have a team in place to relieve the team that has been on duty these past few years. Priority goes to volunteers who live within fifteen minutes or so from the church.


