Dear Friends,

Many of us have heard about Episcopal Bishop Marianne Budde's sermon at the Inaugural Prayer Service in Washington National Cathedral on January 21, 2025. The final four minutes of her sermon, when Bishop Budde pleaded for the newly inaugurated president to show mercy toward LGBTQ+ people, immigrants, and children, have gone viral. Many have cheered her bravery in locking eyes with the president and calling on him to use his power, as Christ instructs, for compassionate treatment of all, especially the most vulnerable among us. Others called her statements inappropriate, demanded an apology, and sent her death threats.

Author Diana Butler Bass says that the final prophetic minutes of Budde's sermon stand alone, but they're better understood in the context of Budde's sermon on unity. Bishop Budde laid out what she calls the "three foundations" of unity: dignity, honesty, and humility. From scripture, she summarized the three:

- Honor the dignity of every human being.
- Speak the truth to one another in love.
- Walk humbly with each other and our God.

Budde was pleading for mercy, for humane, compassionate treatment for all people, especially the vulnerable ones, she said, for they are all our neighbors.

Many of us are grateful that Bishop Budde's comments are leading to some meaningful conversations in our churches and in the public realm. And we hope that these meaningful discussions will lead the way to meaningful action. In the January/ February 2025 issue of Sojourners magazine, Daniel Hunter, the founder of Choose Democracy who trains activists globally in nonviolence, suggested some avenues for activism, pathways of resistance to the harmful policies and rhetoric we are encountering in our country right now. Knowing that we can't respond to everything, but also that we must "resist the temptation to cower in fear, isolation, exhaustion, and constant disorientation," Hunter reminds us to lean hard on community and faith in these tough times. Here are a few of Hunter's suggested pathways of resistance:

**Protect People.** We can discover ways to advocate for and assist those who are directly targeted, such as trans people, folks choosing abortions, and

immigrants. This might mean organizing outside systems for health care and mutual aid or moving resources to communities that are being targeted.

Disrupt and Disobey. In Norway, to create a culture of resistance during World War II, people wore innocuous paperclips as a sign they wouldn't obey. In Serbia, protests against their dictator started with student strikes before escalating to strikes by pensioners before finally escalating to the gamechanging strike of coal miners. Mass noncooperation like bus boycotts during the civil rights era, national strikes, and other nonviolent mass disobedience tactics are the most effective strategies to displace authoritarians.

**Build Alternatives.** We can't only react. We need a vision to build alternatives that are more democratic, loving, and kind. And my addition:

**Pray.** Bring our fears, distress, and hope to God as we seek justice and mercy for our friends, family members, neighbors, and others. At times like these, a familiar prayer helps: The Serenity Prayer:

"God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference."

Christian theologian Reinhold Niebuhr wrote this during the rise of Nazi Germany. May God's light shine through us!

### January Report from Session

At the January 9, 2025 meeting of Session, the following matters were reported, voted upon, and/or discussed:



- **Elections:** For 2025, Terri Bowman was elected as Clerk of Session and Betsy Eskridge was elected as Treasurer.
- **Elders:** William Yee, Pattie Hashimoto, and Irene Uno are terming out. Nomination Committee has one proposed elder and will seek two additional elders.
- Security Grant: William Yee reported that all paperwork for reimbursement has been submitted and received by the California State Nonprofit Security Grant Program. Total reimbursement amount requested is \$81,276. William will make a report during the Congregational Meeting on January 19, 2025.
- Mochi Book Reading Event: On January 12, 2025, following church service, author/illustrator Sharon Fujimoto-Johnson will be reading/talking about her book, "The Mochi Makers." This will be followed by children, adults, and visitors seeing how mochi is made and everyone getting to sample the mochi.
- Rev. Rola's Ministry: Motion was made and approved that Parkview continue to support Rev. Rola's yoga and healing movement ministries as a sponsoring church. Rev. Rola will use the church social hall for her classes.
- Prayer Team and Healing Prayer Team Lunch: Following worship service on January 26, 2025. We will be honoring and thanking Sue Goodwin for all her contributions.
- Session Retreat/Lunch: Will take place in February.
- Mariner's Udon Sale: Scheduled on February 23, 2025. [Note: udon sale cancelled for 2025.]
- **Pledges:** We have received pledges totaling \$90,180.
- Personnel Committee: Evaluation reports have been submitted for Pastor Sarah, Office Manager Kris Sazaki, and Choir Conductor Ben Pryor. Interviews were conducted with favorable reports showing good support by the congregation and satisfied employees.

- Jujikai Funds: There is currently \$2,468 that is being held in reserve. Session voted to reserve \$1,000 as a start-up fund for a future young people's group. The remaining funds of \$1,468 will be transferred to the general fund.
- Tour of Grace Cathedral in San Francisco: Gary Younglove has made arrangements for Parkview members to take a tour of the Cathedral on January 25, 2025. Rev. Dr. Aart van Beek will lead the tour.
- Salary increase for Office Manager and Choir Director: Cost of living increases were approved by Session.
- Pastor's Terms of Call: Out of the presence of Pastor Sarah, Session voted on a cost of living increase for Pastor Sarah. The terms of call will be presented to the church members for a vote during the congregational meeting.
- Pastor's Report: Following the congregational meeting, Pastor Sarah will ask the congregation to go outside into the courtyard so that the fence and other security measures can be blessed and thanks given. This blessing was suggested by church member Carol Sakai. Office Manager Kris will also do a demonstration of the security cameras.



A chair yoga class is offered every other week.

Grab your mat or borrow one of ours (we have so many), invite a friend, and come start your year with meditation, movement, and breath! Let's flow!






