Dear Friends,

The last few months, by nearly any measure, have been difficult. Many of us are reeling from disruptive, disheartening and damaging decisions and events in our country and world. Many of us are heartbroken and angry and ready to resist powers that are dismantling democracy in our country. This month in the Christian Church we proclaim Jesus' death and resurrection. It is a profound privilege but also a daunting responsibility. An insistent call to proclaim emerging warmth and light in the midst of a dark, cold land.

In 1918, English poet and Jesuit priest Gerard Manley Hopkins wrote a poem about a deadly shipwreck. This prayer is in it: "Let him easter in us, be a dayspring to the dimness of us." These days many of us are tired. Many of us are yearning for hope. Some of us may even feel shipwrecked. But Jesus, who rose from the grave, easters in us. He meets us where we are and gives us, as Romans 6 says, "newness of life."

In an Easter essay, Tish Harrison Warren and Jonathan Warren Pagan describe a pattern in Church history in which the Church in a period of vitality slowly grows bored and apathetic. The gospel no longer dazzles. It no longer transforms. Then, people grow skeptical, and ultimately contemptuous of faith. Many lose heart and fall away. The Church seems to lose herself, forget who she is, and have no confidence in her story. But this is a phase that precedes the Spirit's work of renewal. As the Church gets weaker and things look bleaker, the Spirit begins the silent work of rejuvenation. For when we are weak, God is strong. (2 Corinthians 12:9) When we are winded, the winds of the Spirit begin to stir God's people anew. As people grow dissatisfied with the Church, and the world as it is, they are also increasingly certain that they are incapable of solving the

world's problems in their own strength. Small groups of people begin to pray and live as if the resurrection is a central fact of history. And the Church of Jesus Christ is reborn. God's gospel message of renewal, of discovering life and hope, healing and wholeness, in the midst of death and despair, is resurrected.

We-our country, our world, our Church, and ourselves- are a people longing for hope. This Easter, as we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, we need to be reminded that Jesus hasn't abandoned the Church, or the world, even when it seems weary and sometimes, wrecked. There is a profound work of God's Holy Spirit happening in the Church and in us, even now. Jesus showed up most powerfully, not in prosperity, not when things seemed to be going well, not in political dominance, but in a grave. As a stone that was rolled away to release unending life. This Easter, may He easter in us, be a dayspring to the dimness in us, so that we may become people transformed by Jesus' victory over sin and death and evil. People who announce God's good news to a world in search of lifegiving hope.

March Report from Session

The Session did not have a regular meeting in February; instead, there was a Session retreat. At the March 20, 2025 meeting of the Session the following matters were reported, voted upon, and/or discussed:



- The following matters were voted
- on via email and were ratified at this meeting:
- Parkview will be a signatory for a letter supporting the creation of a public education fund which was recommended by California's Black Reparations Task Force.
- Church Statistical Report approved.
- Approval for concrete work near the end of the courtyard ramp which was not included in the Safety & Security grant.
- Review of the church rolls for 2024 (required by Presbyterian Church U.S.A.)
- Volunteers are needed to do the 2024 financial audit
- Plans are being made to re-paint the parking space lines and numbers
- Approval given to Pastor Rola so she can use signs that will direct students to her classes
- Session is considering having a moveable yard sign placed on the front lawn which welcomes all people to join us in worship
- Session decided not to increase the number of parking spaces to rent out
- An informational presentation by a Mental Health worker will be planned for May or June, so that we can learn how to talk to and help people we may encounter who have mental health issues
- Summerfest fundraiser for this year has been canceled. This event is now scheduled for June 28, 2026 (wrong date was mentioned in the March Chapel Chimes).
- A "Welcome to Parkview" brochure has been drafted and is under review
- Easter lilies or plants: The worship team will be requesting interested people to bring a plant to church on Easter Sunday to beautify the sanctuary and to take the plant home after church service.

A Word from Rola

Parkview, here's what's Hello happening at Iama Embodied Ministries.

Our Monday evening series is underway—we've had officially three rich and beautiful gatherings combining embodied so far,



practices, storytelling, and gentle theology.

After sharing with Parkview Presbyterian Women what we mean by trauma-informed and somatic theology on March 30th, we're now exploring the Easter story through that same lens. The Easter narrative is a confusing one for many. From a somatic or trauma-informed perspective, it can feel especially charged: death, betraval, abandonment, and resurrection all packed into one weekend. But what if we pause and notice what often gets overlooked? Saturday.

That in-between space—after death, before resurrection. The silence. The disorientation. The waiting. The Christian narrative doesn't always dwell here, but I believe (controversial as it may be) that this pause is the most important part of the story.

Because many of us live there. In the grief between what was and what's not yet. In the ache of letting go without knowing what comes next. I know this is where I find myself currently-in a cycle of death and rebirth, and in that pause in between.

Whether or not you hold to the resurrection as historical fact, the story speaks to a deeper human truth: that life is full of little deaths and surprising rebirths. That pain is inevitable-and so is transformation.

So if you're in a season that feels like death, know you're not alone. And if you're stuck in the Saturday in-between, as many of us are, hang in there.

Many before you have walked this path, and it is not a linear journey but a cycle. The body breaks and heals, and in between, the silence of transition is painful, but somehow, life always finds a way.

We'll be unpacking this embodied approach to Easter in our next gathering on Monday, April 14 at 6 pm.
