Dear Friends,

One of my favorite outings is stopping by the library and selecting books to add to the pile on the table by the living room chair. Kris taught me a Japanese word for the habit of gathering reading materials and letting them pile up in your home without reading them. The term is tsundoku, and it also refers to unread books on a bookshelf meant for reading. I certainly practice tsundoku at my house! I recently pulled Anne Lamott's book, Hallelujah Anyway: Rediscovering Mercy off the bookshelf. Lamott suggests that as we struggle to navigate an increasingly complex world, mercy points the way forward. By embracing mercy, she says, we give our families, our communities, and even ourselves the opportunity to see each other in gentler, more engaging ways. How our traumatized souls and world need a dose of mercy's good medicine right now!

Diving into Hallelujah Anyway brought to mind another of Lamott's books called, Three Essential Prayers: Help, Thanks, Wow. In this book, Lamott writes,

We say Wow, when we are almost speechless, but not quite. You can manage, barely, this one syllable. When we are stunned to the place beyond words, we're finally starting to get somewhere. It is so much more comfortable when we know what it all means, what to expect and how it all hangs together. When we are stunned to the place beyond words... when all we can say in response is "Wow," that's a prayer.

Wows come in all shapes and sizes, like people. There are lowercase wows, like when you go to the grocery store or the farmer's market and the strawberries look red all the way around. And when you get them home they taste so sweet you feel like doing a cartwheel, which, might lead to an ow, not a wow. A wow might be your first sighting of daffodils in spring, or a heron or egret fishing by the riverbank, or the taste of a really good chocolate. Or a pomegranate martini. Then there are the uppercase Wows. Rainbows and fireworks, magenta sunsets that set the sky on fire, and full moons. Soul-tingling symphonies, the Grand Canyon, Niagara Falls, Mount Fuji. Nature's beauty is often the source of wows for us. Lamott continues, "When all is said and done, spring is the main reason for Wow. Spring is crazy, being all hope and beauty and glory. Spring is the


resurrection. Buds opening, mud and cutting winds, bright green grass and blue skies, nests full of baby birds. All of these are deserving of Wow."

Maybe it's because spring has come in fits and starts this year-one day it's in the 80s, two days later it barely reaches 60, but I've been on the lookout for signs of spring since March. It was Henry Van Dyke who observed in *Fisherman's Luck* that "the first day of spring is one thing, and the first spring day is another." Mark Twain razzed New Englanders when he noted that during their "spring [he had] counted 136 different kinds of weather inside of twenty-four hours." However it comes, or whenever, there's no argument about the Wow of Springtime.

Walking outside accompanied by a warm wind as the light fades later each day, seeing roses burst into bloom along a sidewalk, hearing owls and mourning doves in the twilight, all these bring a Wow of gratitude to my heart. What's causing you to say 'Wow' these days? Looking for 'Wows' becomes a spiritual practice in times like these, when so much of what we hear and see in the news is cause for woe, not 'Wow'.

May God bless us with the joy of Jesus' presence with us always, for He is risen from the grave and bringing God's grace and peace to earth-He's the best Wow of all!



SSIP's Response Plan in Changing Times

With a steady increase in clients and the anticipation of funding cuts, SSIP (South Sacramento Interfaith Partnership) is implementing a response plan to keep wholesome food on the tables of our neighbors in need. Since March, the Food



Closet has been taking in around eight new households each day. Even so, we remain open five mornings a week, and everyone is welcome. However, our clients will begin receiving one full allotment of food per week instead of two, with larger families receiving more food. A bag of USDA food will remain available 5 days/week. We plan to increase the food purchase budget by at least 50% to maintain a full allotment of food between 25-30 pounds.

To meet the growing needs of our community, the Food Closet hired Volunteer Coordinator Corinna Herrera and Operations Manager Joseph Drew. We look forward to their leadership in the important work of SSIP, which has been a heavily volunteer-run leadership model since its beginning more than 55 years ago. The rapid expansion of our mission required additional staff to sustain steady daily distribution. As in the past, when faced with challenges, SSIP finds the opportunity to reinvent itself during difficult times and come out of it much stronger and better. This time is no different.

Thanks to an incredible turnout, the generosity of donors, and the enthusiastic team of volunteers who made it happen, the Food Closet's annual fundraiser, Full Plates/Full Hearts, was a huge success. Over \$90,000 net (and growing) was raised for the ongoing mission of the South Sacramento Interfaith Partnership!


