Dear Friends,

Soon after we graduated from seminary, Dwight and I served a country church in Virginia in the foothills of the Allegheny Mountains. Our parishioners were farmers and heating oil suppliers, construction workers, teachers, and nurses. Once when Dwight made a pastoral visit, the husband took him out to the garage and offered him moonshine. “Did you drink it?” I asked him later. “It sure burned going down,” he replied. I admit being grateful no one ever pulled up at our townhouse with fresh venison, aka a dead deer, as a gift for their pastors. This Christmas story, author unknown, reminds me of our time with those good folks back in the Virginia holler.

Anyone Missing Jesus?

About a week before Christmas the family bought a new nativity scene. When we unpacked it, we found two figures of the Baby Jesus. “Someone must have packed this wrong,” Mother said, counting out the figures. “We have one Joseph, one Mary, three wise men, three shepherds, two lambs, a donkey, a cow, and angel, and two babies. Oh, dear! I suppose some set down at the store is missing a Baby Jesus because we have two. You children run back down to the store and tell the manager we have an extra Jesus. Tell him to put a sign on the remaining boxes saying that if a set is missing a Baby Jesus, call 7162.” All week long we waited for someone to call. Surely, we thought, someone was missing that important figure.

Just before the store closed for Christmas, we went down to see if there were any sets left. Seeing none, we trudged back home. When we got back to the house, we noticed that Mother was gone and so was the extra Baby Jesus. “Someone must have called, and she went out to deliver the figurine,” my father reasoned, pulling off his boots. “You kids get ready for bed while I wrap Mother’s present.” Then the phone rang. Father yelled, “Answer the phone and tell ‘em we found a home for Jesus.” But it was Mother calling with instructions for us to come to 205 Chestnut Street immediately and

bring three blankets, a box of cookies and some milk.

When we got to the house at 205 Chestnut Street, it was the darkest one on the block. Only one tiny light burned in the living room, and the moment we set foot on the front steps, my mother opened the door and shouted, “They’re here. Thank God, you got her, Ray! You kids take those blankets into the living room and wrap up the little ones on the couch. I’ll take the milk and cookies. There is no heat in this house and this young mother is so upset she doesn’t know what to do. Her husband walked out on her and those poor little children. I told her you could fix that oil furnace in a jiffy.” The children’s mother explained that her husband had run off, taking bedding, clothing, and almost every piece of furniture, but she had been doing all right until the furnace broke down. “I been doing washin’ and ironin’ for people and cleanin’ the five and dime,” she said. “I saw your number every day there, on those boxes on the counter. When the furnace went out, that number kept going through my mind, ‘7162, 7162.’ Said on the box if a person was missin’ Jesus, they should call you. That’s how I knew you were good Christian people, willin’ to help folks. I figured that maybe you would help me, too. So I stopped at the grocery store tonight and called you. I’m not missin’ Jesus, because I sure love the Lord. But I am missin’ heat. I have no money to fix that furnace.”

While Father fixed the furnace, Mother came into the living room carrying a plate of cookies and warm milk. As she set the cups down on the coffee table, I noticed the figure of Baby Jesus lying in the center of the table. It was the only sign of Christmas in the house. No one ever did call about the missing figure in the nativity set, but as I grew older I realized that it wasn’t a packing mistake at all. Jesus cares, that’s what it’s all about.

God bless us every one, that we may be a blessing.

November Report from Session

The November 13, 2025 meeting of the Session was held at Parkview. The following actions were discussed and/or voted on:



- The following email vote was ratified at the Session meeting: Parkview Presbyterian Church joined as a signator for a letter from the Wakasa Memorial Committee concerning a memorial stone that was discovered at the WWII Topaz incarceration camp in Utah. A note was added with our signature encouraging mutual respect and reconciliation.
- The \$2,500 grant funds received from NCCP Mission Support has been spent on supplies to help our local immigrant communities. The supplies will be delivered to NorCal Resist. Thanks to our savvy shoppers: Terri, John, Marilyn, Aki, Lois and son Ben, and Judy Y.
- Donations collected for the Thanksgiving Showtime on Nov 16 will be divided between Parkview and Pastor Igor's ministry in Ukraine.
- Session will schedule an after-church gathering at Parkview so that Parkview attendees can obtain training and information on how to respond to ICE activity happening near our church.
- We are considering whether "white spaces" on our buildings can be used for messaging. Please share your thoughts and ideas with Session members.
- Sidewalk vendor request: one of the street vendors asked for written permission to set up a table on Parkview property (between the street and sidewalk). Written permission has been given until the end of July 2026 (when the City permit expires); however, restrictions have been included to control the size of the table/cart, prohibiting the use of the loading zone and blocking our main entrance, trash pick-up, etc.
- Thank you to Buildings and Grounds committee, Parkview work crew, and supervisor Stan Umeda for working on the main gate entrance.
- Advent begins on Sunday, Nov 30. We will decorate the Christmas tree and sanctuary after church service on Nov. 30.

YES Making Change for Good

Parkview's YES youth are collecting spare change to donate to various charities addressing global and local hunger, clean water, and shelter. Join them in this important service project by bringing in your spare change for good! The charities we have chosen are:

- Heifer International, whose mission is to end global hunger and poverty by supporting farmers and their communities in Africa, Asia, and the Americas. \$20-\$500 will supply a family with chicks, ducks, honeybees, a sheep, pig, goat, or water buffalo.
- Always Mercy, a US non-profit organization working in Kenya with a mission to support clean water and medical care. Water-borne diseases are a major source of illness in Kenya. \$60 provides a family with safe, clean water for up to 10 years.
- Heal Palestine helps shelter families in Gaza who have been uprooted again and again. \$387 covers the cost of one durable weather-rated family tent for 6-8 people.
- SSIP provides groceries to local families in need.

There is a collection box in the social hall, as well as a poster tracking their progress, You can bring your change (paper bills and checks accepted, too!). The campaign will run through MLK Day. We're excited to see how the kids decide to allocate the funds collected!

Parkview is fueled by its volunteers, many working behind the scenes to keep the church going.



ICE Preparation Presentation at Parkview

After worship on November 30, Parkview's very own Kishwer Vikaas and NorCal Resist staff attorney, Giselle Garcia, provided a Know Your Rights training in the social hall. Both Kishwer and Giselle are immigration attorneys who are knowledgeable and passionate about protecting the rights of everyone in our communities, especially our undocumented neighbors. They noted that many of us were raised to be polite and to comply with people in authority. We need to rethink unquestioning compliance as ICE agents and law enforcement are currently doing unlawful things in the name of immigration reform. They are refusing to identify themselves, dressing in plainclothes rather than a uniform, and covering their faces to avoid detection. ICE agents often use intimidation and insufficient warrants to detain their targets and gain access to cars and homes.

Kishwer and Giselle provided crucial info on how we can assert our rights in these situations. This not only provides protection for us against deceptive and harmful tactics, it helps us stand up for our immigrant neighbors who are currently being targeted for arrest, detention, and deportation. Here are the statements we all need in order to assert our fundamental rights in case we are stopped and questioned by law enforcement, or they attempt to enter our home.

1. Officer, am I detained or am I free to go?
2. Officer, I do not consent to be searched. (If they have a valid warrant signed by a judge, they can do the search. Most do not.) If they come to your home, do not open the door.
3. Officer, I assert my right to remain silent. (Then keep silent, don't talk.)
4. Officer, I request an attorney.
5. Officer, I will not sign any documents. (If it's a traffic violation, like speeding, and you were in fact speeding, you need to sign that.)

Here's another crucial thing we learned: We have the right to record in public spaces. This protects us, and provides a record of what happens to us, or to others. Officers will tell us to stop recording. We can say,

6. Officer, this is a public space, I have a right to record. I am 5-6 feet (distance) away from you, I am not obstructing you. (Remember to stay back, but we can record. In our car, also.)





Thank You, Kishwer and Giselle, for your vital work of building justice and empowering us to resist unlawful, inhumane treatment of our brothers and sisters, and ourselves.


Two Important Exhibitions to See
