Dear Friends,

Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI or AANHPI) Heritage Month\* is celebrated in the United States the entire month of May to recognize the history, culture, and achievements of Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders. It pays tribute to the generations of Asian Americans, Pacific Islander, and Native Hawaiians who have enriched America's history and who are crucial to its future.

Why May? AAPI/AANHPI Heritage Month occurs in May to commemorate the immigration of the first Japanese to the U.S. on May 7, 1843, as well as the May 10, 1869 completion of the transcontinental railroad, which was largely built by Chinese immigrants. This year's national theme, "Power in Unity: Strengthening Communities Together," highlights the importance of collaborative strength, storytelling, and building bridges across communities.

We build bridges from the past to the future when we share our cultural origin-stories around tables during meals with family and friends. When we eat together, we share not only family stories and traditions but foods that are significant to us, as they were to our ancestors, foods that mean 'home' to those who are miles, maybe oceans, away from their family roots. A wonderful part of serving as Parkview's pastor has been learning about other cultures' foods and sampling them. Yum!

I recently learned about the origin of the fortune cookie. When a group from Parkview took a walking tour of Sacramento murals on April 18, our guide, Henry, pointed out the building that houses the New World Co., a factory that makes up to 32,000 fortune cookies a day. Folks say you know you're close by when you catch the aromas of sugar and vanilla wafting through the air along 10<sup>th</sup> and Q Streets. Qiang Yee started the fortune cookie factory at 1713 10<sup>th</sup> Street in 1990. Yasheng Feng has been running New World Co. for the past ten years.

According to [History.com](https://www.history.com), fortune cookies originated from 19<sup>th</sup>-century Japanese crackers called tsujiura senbei ("fortune crackers"). These fortune crackers from Kyoto were often sold with fortunes tucked into the folds. They were introduced to California and Hawaii by Japanese immigrants. Makoto Hagiwara, who ran the Japanese Tea Garden in San Francisco's Golden Gate Park, is often credited with popularizing a sweeter version around 1914. Hagiwara sourced his crackers from Japanese-owned bakeries like Benkyodo. During World War II, when Japanese Americans were forced into incarceration camps, fortune cracker production stopped. That's when Chinese entrepreneurs started making the cookies, and the fortune cookie became associated with Chinese-American restaurants.



The first time I had a fortune cookie was on a high-school band trip to New York City. We ate lunch in a Chinese restaurant, my first time eating Chinese food. I grew up in the South and in my family, eating tacos was wildly daring. I had my first quesadilla during seminary in Pasadena; I'm a late food bloomer. So, eating Mieko's mochi, Haruko's udon, and Luda's mom's desserts at Parkview has been a tasty cultural adventure.

Our understanding of God is limited when we see God through only one cultural perspective. As an intercultural church, when we worship, eat, and serve together as followers of Jesus Christ within our differences and diversities, God's beloved community is formed among us.

## April Report from Session

The April 16, 2026 meeting of the Session was held at Parkview. The following actions were discussed and/or voted on:



- Pastor Sarah opened the meeting with prayer at 5:30 p.m.
- Motion was passed to accept Judy Fukuman to serve as temporary Clerk of Session in the absence of Clerk of Session Jana Nakase-Lee.
- Pastor Sarah will be attending her daughter Han-Bee's baptism the weekend of April 25-26. Both daughters Chelsea and Han-Bee will be joining a progressive church. In Pastor Sarah's absence, the guest speaker will be Rev. Don Strongman.
- Session approved Jack Nordman to represent Parkview on a mission trip to Metlakatla, Alaska, sponsored by SOULutions Ministries from June 18-27, 2026.
- A major concern continues to be overnight campers who leave trash and waste near and around church grounds and discussion was held as to the resolution of the matter and cleanup. Non-emergency police may be called upon to drive by and volunteers will be needed to help clean up the trash and other matters.
- Congratulations goes to Rev. Rola on receiving her "Green Card."
- Rev. Rola requested permission to show Lebanese films featuring everyday life and the war to raise awareness with discussion circles as a fundraiser for Iama Yoga. More details to follow.
- Mission Giving Budget is \$15,000. This year, Session approved giving up to \$2K for the Paradise Fire mission trip. Additional Giving recommendations for this year will be studied further.
- Aki Kumagai reported that he and Gary Younglove have been looking into installing a projector and screen with Mark Nagata as consultant; they will convene a group from church to discuss the different options
- Ukraine Concert—May 17, 2026: Help to set up chairs for the Ukraine fundraiser on either Friday or Saturday before the concert has been requested. Signage will be installed in the wooden box outside the church announcing the Ukraine fundraiser.

- Outreach and free ad for the Ukraine concert fundraiser will be included in the Inside Magazine.
- May 10, 2026: Mother's Day.
- Haruko Sakakibara would like to incorporate Japanese hymns and Japanese Christian culture in future worship services.
- July 4, 2026: Nation's 250<sup>th</sup> Independence Day celebration with a potluck and fireworks at Parkview was approved.
- Prayer by Pastor Sarah and meeting was adjourned at 7:32 p.m.

## Parkview Folks Make Pilgrimage to Manzanar

The Florin-Sacramento Valley chapter of the Japanese American Citizens League (JACL) had its 21st Manzanar Pilgrimage April 24-26. The six participants from Parkview Presbyterian Church were:

Jody Brown, Judy Fukuman, Donna Komure-Toyama, Titus Toyama, Kaitlin Toyama, and Christine Umeda.

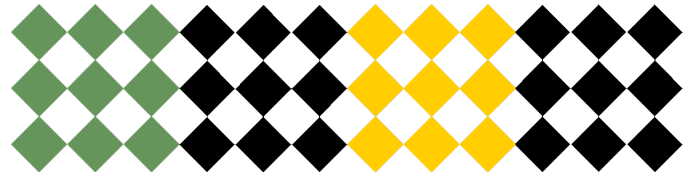
It was a busy but enriching and moving experience for all of us. We were fortunate to hear

the stories from people who are survivors of the wartime incarceration (including Christine and Judy) and to have retired Manzanar Superintendent Bernadette Lovato Johnson as our guide. Also, a highlight of this trip was the Friday evening cultural exchange with participants from the AkaMya Culture Group, Iwa Daiko taiko collective, CAIR-Sacramento Valley (Council on American Islamic Relations), and local government dignitaries.

The evening ended with Japanese folk dances and Native American dances including their potato dance and hoop dance. We joined the Manzanar Committee's program, titled "Lessons from Manzanar: Vigilance is the Price of Democracy." Keynote speaker was attorney Dale Minami who was involved in reopening Fred Korematsu's U.S. Supreme Court case based on a hidden document described in Rachael Madow's podcast, "Burn Order."

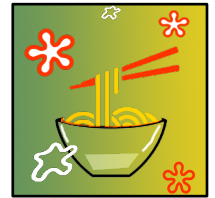

## Thank You, CROP Walkers and Donors

A big shout-out of thanks to all who participated in this year's Church World CROP Walk, as walkers, donors, or both. Through your generosity, you are helping Church World Service:

- In **Moldova**, assist Ukrainian refugees and host communities by providing for basic needs, including mental health care.
- Help **Cambodian communities** develop more sustainable means of subsistence, including drought-resistant crops.
- In **Indonesia**, offer safe shelter for unaccompanied refugee children and women.
- In **Myanmar**, work with communities to build sanitary, flood-resistant toilets, enabling families to develop improved hygiene habits.
- In the **Democratic Republic of Congo**, provide seed packets to impoverished families, helping enable a continuing food supply.
- Invite **Eastern European countries** to participate in the CWS Renewable Energy program, through which they learn how to use alternative energy sources.
- In the **Middle East**, participate in the Ecumenical Accompaniment Program, whereby volunteers live in West Bank communities for three months, then, upon their return home, share their experiences.
- In **Kenya**, work with local communities to strengthen food security, improve livelihoods, and build resilience to climate change.
- In **Tanzania**, work with families to address food security, introducing agricultural programs which provide the materials to ensure stable incomes and teach improved farming techniques.
- In the dry **Gran Chaco region of South America**, help communities improve their access to water, frequently having to deal with well-funded commercial farming ventures.
- Elsewhere in **South America**, helping protect the rights of families with incarcerated parents.
- In **Central America**, helping families find diverse ways to support themselves, including coping with climate change and providing resources when disasters strike.
- At the **US-Mexico border**, assist asylum seekers address immediate basic needs such as food and shelter.
- In the **United States**, offering disaster relief for such natural disasters as flooding, wildfires, and hurricanes.

- Through a network of 20 affiliates and 24 partner agencies spread throughout the United States, ensuring disaster relief and successful refugee resettlement from Miami FL to Anchorage AK.

## Tour of Locke, CA Scheduled for September 5

Let's visit Locke in the Fall! Locke, California, is the largest and last surviving rural Chinatown in the United States, built by Chinese laborers who transformed the Sacramento Delta into agricultural land. It was designated a National Historic Landmark District in 1990 and was placed on the National Registry of Historical Places in 1971. Join Parkview for a complementary private tour of Locke in the Fall. Stroll down historic Main Street and visit the museums in Locke. Enjoy Locke Memorial Park and its peaceful and reflective scenery. Our tour is scheduled for September 25, 2026 at 11 am and is one hour and thirty minutes in duration. The historic town of Locke has many uneven sidewalks, boardwalks, and terrain which could be a challenge, and caution is advised. There is a maximum of 15 attendees allowed on the tour per the Locke Foundation. PPW's Activities Committee will announce the signup date and the online sign up process. A second complementary tour is tentatively scheduled on October 10, 2026 if there is a minimum of 10 attendees.

This tour complements the documentary film, "Voices : Chinese Women of the Delta" shown during the PPW installation luncheon in March. Experience walking in the historic footsteps of the Locke founders and residents as described by Carol Lee from the Locke Oral History Project.

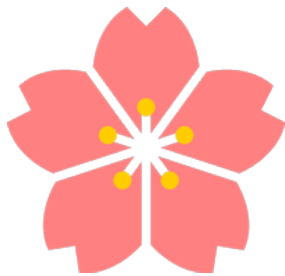
